Messrs. J. M. Clark, H.C.R., and L. U. Fowler, H.S. of the I.O.F., were in the city yesterday returning from a trip to the eastern part of the Island.

A SUBSCRIBER in Providence R. I., writes:—Mr. A. A. Gillis of Providence is doctoring horses with good success. He performed several operations this winter despite the severe cold weather.

The Stanley arrived at Georgetown yesterday morning with 30 passengers and 15 bags of mail. The passengers arrived in the city by special train at 4 o'clock. The Stanley leaves Georgetown at 7 o'clock this morning for Picton.

The Prince Edward Island Club of Boston, at the meeting held at the residence of Misses Eta and Alice Sinnott last Thursday night, voted to limit the membership, as applications were being received too rapidly. The quarterly meeting and dinner is to be held April 6 at the United States hotel there.

CAPT. A. R. McDONALD, of Souris, P. E. I., in a letter to the Halifax Chronicle, expresses his deep gratitude to Capt. Campbell, Mr. Blakeney, chief officer, Mr. Ferguson, chief engineer, and Mr. Hutchins, light house inspector, for their great kindness toward his son, Capt. James McDonald, of the schooner T. W. Holder. It will be remembered, the T. W. Holder was picked up by the steamer Aberdeen off Country Harbor. She was then in a disabled condition, badly iced up, rolling in the trough of the sea and the crew badly frozen. To add to their misfortune, Capt. McDonald was struck by a sea and had a leg broken. The Aberdeen bore down on the schooner and rescued the crew from a sure death. They were brought to Halifax and sent to hospital, were Capt. McDonald still remains, although greatly improved. Capt. A. R. McDonald, father of the injured captain, in his letter to the Chronicle, expresses gratitude for the timely rescue of his son and the subsequent kind treatment which he and his crew received at the hands of the officers of the Aberdeen and Mr. Hutchins, who was on board at the time. Capt. McDonald says he feels sure that had the Aberdeen not borne down on the disabled vessel at that particular time, no would have been spared to tell the tale. He feels that through the noble efforts of the Aberdeen's crew the lives of his son and five seamen, as well as the vessel and cargo were saved.

She was a member of the Presbyterian Church and favorably esteemed in the community.

### AMONG THE SPORTS.

Yale has offered Wisconsin University the date of Oct. 21 for a football game.

The Victorias defeated Montreal in the championship hockey series at the Arena rink, Montreal, Saturday night, by 10 goals to 6. The Victorias were without McLea and Macdougall, but showed better judgment, and more staying power than their opponents.

The 2nd Victorias and Crescents will play the final match for the intermediate trophy on Tuesday next. The trophy will be presented to the winning team at the close of the game by His Worship the Mayor. On the same evening the West Keut and Y. M. C. A. hockey clubs will cross sticks.

A six-day cycle race for women will be held in Montreal during the Easter week, on a 22-lap track. The conditions require only two hours' riding a night. But in order to figure in the distribution of prize money a contestant will have to ride at least 200 miles during the 12 hours. The smallness of the track is likely to make the task a hard one.

HOCKEY IN HALIFAX. HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 26.—The Amherst hockey team, on which played Spittal and Young of Ottawa, last night defeated the Mutuals of Dartmouth by a score of 6 to 4. The score stood 4 to 4 in the second half with five and a half minutes more to finish, when Capt. Douglass of Amherst, collided with a goal-box with such force that he was carried off the ice insensible, and had to be driven to his hotel. One of the Mutuals was ordered off for tripping Douglass previous to this, and having to drop another man on account of the accident to Douglass, the game continued six men to five, and the six who were Amherstonians, scored two more goals and won the game. There was not much combination play, but the individual work on both sides was excellent.

HARVARD BALL PLAYERS. BOSTON, Feb. 28.—The candidates for the Harvard varsity nine began their work this season with a strong nucleus of old players. The team loses Rand, left field; Hayes, pitcher; Robinson, third base, and Burgess, right field, of last year's varsity. The men who were on the varsity squad last year and are expected to come out this year are Davis, catcher; Fitz, Morse and McCormack, pitchers; Lewis, first base; Captain Haughton, second base; Laughlin, shortstop; Clark, who played third base part of the time, and Sears and Lynch, outfielders. Reid will not come out this season, partly because the strain of training for both football and baseball is to severe. The prospects at present seem to indicate a team of excellent fielders, but weak both in batting and in the battery.
