EX-CONVICT SOUGHT IN KIDNAP - SLAYING

DEATH KNIFE SOUGHT AS MATTSON CLUE

Police Impound Abandoned Automobile Reported Containing Blood-soaked Clothing.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 13—(AP)—The name of a former California convict flashed tonight out of the widening hunt for the kidnap-killer of little Charles Mattson while Everett police threw a close guard about an abandoned automobile supposedly containing blood-soaked clothing.

Officials at Folsom Prison disclosed Federal manhunters were seeking Fred Orrin Haynes, "repeater" convict, but Warden Clarence A. Larkin said later he had given out the information before realizing it was wanted in the hunt. Government officials here filed a Federal court a John Doe warrant charging kidnaping under the Lindbergh law, with extortion and conspiracy to kidnap and extort money.

They explained this was done to make the abductor legally a fugitive from justice and to make anyone harboring him liable to punishment.

CHECK FINGERPRINTS

The California State Bureau of Identification said it had been requested to check Haynes' fingerprints but that it would give no details without permission from the Justice Department.

Records of this bureau showed Haynes has a very prominent and slightly hooked nose—a characteristic of the abductor according to some sources.

Police impounded the abandoned auto last night when a north-end resident reported it had been parked.

POPE PIUS QUILTS SICKBED

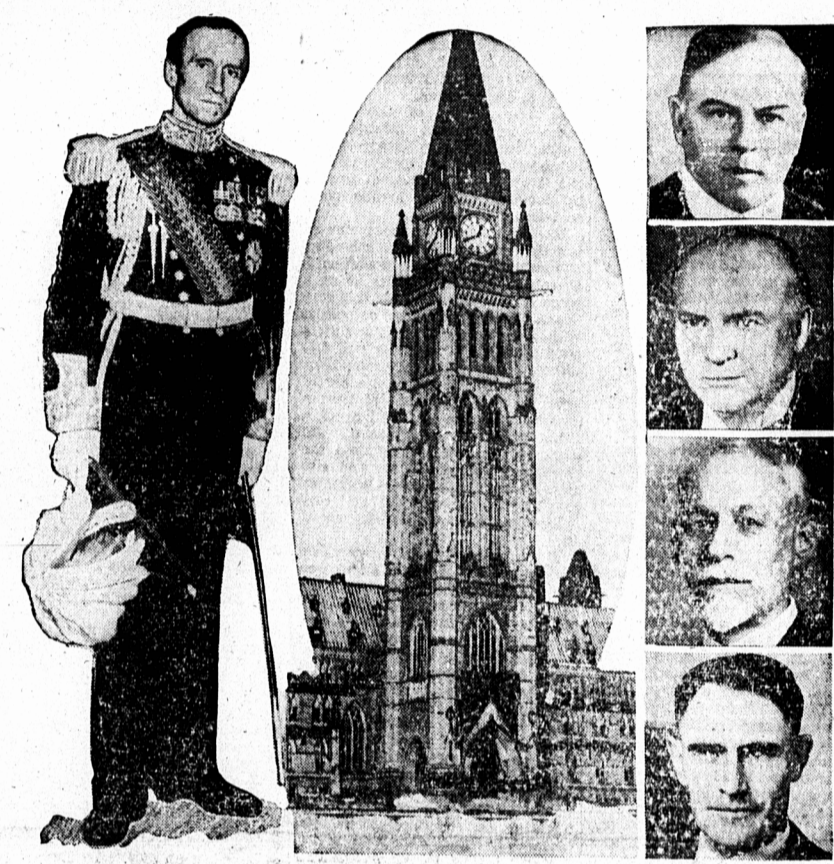
Disregards Warnings of Doctors. Receives Visitors.

BEAUHARNOIS GETS JUDGMENT AGAINST HYDRO

Awarded \$573,750 Plus Interest In Cancellation Of Power Agreements By Ontario.

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Jan. 13—Judgment for \$573,750 and interest was given by Chief Justice Hugh E. Rose today in favor of Beauharnois Light, Heat and Power Company of Montreal against the Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission.

The Commission claimed in its Supreme Court action that the amount awarded was due under an agreement with the Commission by which it was to supply or hold available for the Commission 250,000 horsepower of electric energy at \$15 per horsepower.

Germany Seeks Support Of Italy On Colonial Demands

Drowned Coxswain Blamed For Tragedy

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Jan. 13—(CP Cable)—The drowned coxswain of a Kingston harbor launch was held responsible tonight by the majority of a coroner's jury for the deaths of 35 persons following the launch's capsizing during a Christmas day excursion.

Lull In Fighting On Madrid Front

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MADRID, Jan. 13—Government scouting parties groped through the entire Madrid front tonight, sniping insurgent barbed wire, skirmishing with enemy outposts and crawling back to their main lines with information to pave the way for a major governmental counter-offensive.

Short Session Seen In View Of Coronation

Hope For Prorogation In Time For King's Coronation Will Spur Government Members.

OTTAWA, Jan. 13—(CP)—For the second time within a year Parliament meets tomorrow with a new Sovereign on the Throne and with references to the Crown striking a keynote to the proceedings, but without the mournful atmosphere that pervaded the opening last February.

The second session of Canada's 18th Parliament since Confederation will be launched by Lord Tweedsmuir with all the color and ceremony that tradition has established. Members will plunge almost at once into what is generally expected to prove a short but interesting session, hoping to prorogue in time for the King's Coronation in May and the Imperial Conference which will follow immediately after.

Cabinet Council was in session this afternoon but no announcements followed. It is understood the legislative program has been completed as far as possible and the Speech from the Throne has been sent to the printers.

PROGRAM TODAY

Only formalities are on the program today. Members of the House of Commons will be summoned at three o'clock by the gentleman-usher-of-the-black-rod to attend in the Senate Chamber. There His Excellency will present the Speech from the Throne.

Returning to the Green Chamber the Commons members will sit only briefly for the formality of greeting four new members who have been elected during the recess and the reading again of the Speech from the Throne, after moving a "bill pro-forma" as a time-honored gesture of independence.

Adjournment will be taken until Friday afternoon when the order of business will include tabling of the returns moved but not presented at the last session, and numerous annual departmental reports, usually a great volume of information.

Tributes will then be paid the members who died since the last session, these including former Postmaster-General P. J. Veniot, Gloucester, and F. W. Perras, Wright.

An address of loyalty to King George VI will be moved by Prime Minister Mackenzie King and spoken to by the leaders of other groups.

Monday's Session

On Monday the House will take up the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne. It will be moved by Norman McLarty, (Lib. Essex West) and seconded by Dr. F. J. Veniot, elected by acclamation to the vacancy in Gloucester created by the death of his father.

In the Speech from the Throne and in all the addresses that will follow it, first words will be devoted to expressions of feeling on the abdication of King Edward VIII and pledges of loyalty to the new Sovereign.

Reports here indicate negotiations for the revision of the Canadian-United Kingdom trade agreement are so far advanced the Throne Speech may possibly inform Parliament ratification of the changes will be asked this session. Lord Tweedsmuir will read a
