SILVER LEAVES.—As a New Year's greeting from R. and Mrs. Burrows, 82 East Road, Married Quarters, Johannesburg, S. A., and formerly of this Province, The Guardian has received a collection of beautiful silver leaves taken from Table Mountain in Cape Town. They are very handsome and much appreciated coming from such far away friends.

A GOOD RECORD.—A telegram received from the Manager of the North American Life Assurance Co., Toronto, on New Year's day extends congratulations to J. K. Ross, Provincial Manager, for this province on the fact that the company wrote over seven and a half millions of new business for 1912 being the largest in the company's history. The increase in premium income and interest returns were also large and indicate a banner year for the North American Life.

DEED IN AUGUSTA.—The late Miss Christina B. McDonald who died in Augusta, Maine, Hospital, Dec. 17th, was formerly of Bethel, Oct. 4, P. E. I., the daughter of Donald and Mrs. McDonald of that place. The funeral took place from her father's residence to Birch Hill Cemetery on Dec. 25th the funeral service being conducted by Rev. D. McLane, Charlottetown. The pallbearers were John McDonald, Cecil Wood, Daniel and Warren Myers, Ernest and Frank Lund. The deceased was in her 25th year and leaves to mourn a sorrowing father and mother, three brothers and two sisters, Edward in the Canadian West, John and Daniel at home, Sadie and Laura at home.

AN APPRECIATION.—The Christmas examination of the St. Augustine School, Rustico, took place on Monday 23rd. There was a large attendance of pupils, parents, and visitors. The children were examined in the various subjects by the following teachers—Miss Gertrude Fincau, and Miss Alvin Gallant. The program consisted of recitations and dialogues all of which brought forth much applause from those present. Allan Peters, on behalf of the scholars, presented their teacher Miss Aggie Hucote with a toilet case as a token of their appreciation of her efforts on their behalf, while Wilfred Peters read the address. At the close of the examination brief remarks were passed by Jos. J. Doucette, Moses Doucette and Dennis Arsenault. After treating the children to candy the meeting closed by the singing of the National Anthem.

GOOD RECORD.—A bulletin giving the census of the manufacturers of Canada has just been issued. Compared with the census of 1901, it shows an increase in the ten years of 4568 in the number of working establishments, of \$809,667,122 in the value of capital, of 176,030 in the number of persons employed, of \$127,759,066 in the earnings of salaries and wages, and of \$82,223 in the value of products. The establishment in Prince Edward Island are given as follows:—Butter and cheese, 34, carriages and wagons, 8, men's custom clothing 5, electric light and power 3, preserved fish 16, flour and grist mill products 53, leather, tanned and finished 3, lime 3, log products 100, lumber products 12, plumbing and tin-smithing 4, printing and publishing 5, starch 7, tobacco, chewing, smoking and snuff 3, wool, carding and finishing 4, all other industries 19. This gives a total of 448 industries, with a capital of \$2,012,385.

GOOD LECTURE.—On Friday, Dec. 20th, J. H. Bell, K. C., Summerside, delivered one of his very interesting lectures under the auspices of Union Division No. 45, S. O. T. at the Springfield Temperance Hall. A very large audience were present and the lecturer was listened to with rapt attention throughout his able and instructive discourse, which gave the listener a very vivid description of the scenes and customs, which he met with during his trip to the Holy Land. At the close of the lecture several spokes of the excellent manner in which they had been entertained also of the ability of the learned speaker. A vote of thanks was then unanimously tendered Mr. Bell, who made a brief acknowledgment. J. E. Sinclair then auctioned the pie which realized the very best prices, averaging over \$2.25 each, which shows that the Springfield youths love the fair maidens more than the almighty dollar. A goodly sum was realized which goes toward the hall building fund.

POPULAR APPOINTMENT.—Rev. George Steel has signified to the mission rooms, says The Wesleyan, his willingness to take the office of Superintendent of Missions, to which he was appointed last October. He feels that the creation of the office has fully justified itself and that it needs to be filled for a while yet. To refuse to accept it on the grounds of consideration for health or for any personal reasons might have the appearance of cowardice. He, however, will not begin the full duties of the office till about Conference, nor of course will he receive pay until he devotes himself altogether to the work. In the meantime he will attend the meetings of the Conference, Missionary Committee and any District Meetings that it may be necessary for him to attend where the boundaries of any missions are being affected by changes that are being made. Mr. Steel has been led to accept largely in response to the request of many Armen who urged him to give himself to the service of the church in this line of work. Mr. Steel was formerly of this Province.

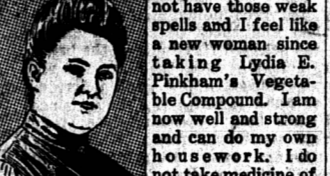
