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CAMPBELL BREAKS OWN AUTO SPEED RECORD

Drives Bluebird Down Stretch At Over 276 M.P.H.

English Speed Ace Near Death When Car Hits Bump After Thundering Through Measured Mile.

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., March 7.—Sir Malcolm Campbell ditched his thunder-wagon to a streak of lightning today and roared down Daytona's golden sands to a new world automobile speed record—276.816 miles-an-hour.

It was far short of the 300-mile goal he has set for himself and the seven-ton Bluebird, but it was 4.708 miles-an-hour swifter than the 272.108-mile average he travelled establishing the old mark here two years ago.

It was an unexpected sortie, result of a last minute decision to wait no longer for the sands to smooth to the perfection needed for 300 miles-an-hour. The result left him happy, but slightly shaken from the narrow escape he had shortly after thundering through the measured mile on the return trip.

CLOSE CALL

A bump there almost tore the steering wheel from his hands, sent the car careening high on the beach until the tires were just skimming the edge of the deadly soft sands. With a terrific effort the 50 year old Englishman wrenched the wheel back, skidded to the safety of the hard sands, and was away to the end of the run and the new record.

"I haven't decided yet whether to try to lift the record higher," Sir Malcolm said as he rode back down the beach in the 260-horsepower monster while 50,000, lining the 1 1/2-mile course, cheered the length of the way. "I won't decide that until I have a chance to think things over."

The run today, though only slightly above his old record, was as dangerous as any he has made here—and every time he has taken Bluebird to the beach during his venture something has happened.

Series Of Happenings

First his cowling broke loose and carbon monoxide fumes nearly gassed him as exhaust flames flicked at his legs. Then he was nearly thrown from the car on a test run in which he hit a one-way speed of 270. Today was one gigantic surge, and his tires.

He stood and stared in amazement at the racing cords on old Bluebird as he looked the car over in the front of the timing tower when it was all over. The smooth rubber surface of all six tires—two in front, four on back—was literally
