Royal Visit To C'town Details Of Programme For June 14.

Interesting items on the Royal tour programme as designed for Prince Edward Island. This information, released by the Central Committee is authentic and is substantially correct, subject, however, to such minor changes as may be deemed necessary from time to time. 11.30 P.M. Wednesday, June 14:—H.M.C.S. "Skeena" and H.M.C.S. "Saguenay" will dock at the Marine Wharf, Charlottetown. Royal Artillery salute (8th Medium Battery, R.C.A.—Major A. W. Matheson). Their Majesties will disembark at the Prime Minister of Canada and will present His Honour the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island (the Honourable George Desbriay, DeBelois) and Prince Edward Island (the Honourable Thane A. Campbell) and Mrs. Campbell; His Worship the Mayor of Charlottetown (E. A. Foster Esq.) and Mrs. Foster Esq.; District Officer Commanding. His Majesty will inspect the Guard of Honour (Prince Edward Island Highlanders—Captain J. Coles, M.M.). The Royal Party will drive to Province Building via Great George Street. The seating arrangements in the cars will be as follows. Car No. 1:—His Majesty the King, Her Majesty the Queen, Equerry in Waiting, Commander Abel-Smith. Car No. 2:—His Honour the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, Wife of the Lieutenant Governor, Prime Minister of Canada, Principal Secretaries to the Prime Minister, A.D.C. to the Lieutenant Governor. Car No. 3:—Member of the Federal Cabinet (Prince Edward Island), Wife of Member of Federal Cabinet. Lady in Waiting to the Queen, Lord in Waiting to the King. Car No. 4:—Premier of Prince Edward Island, Deputy Premier, Equerry in Waiting to the Queen, Lord Chamberlain to the Queen. Car No. 5:—Mayor of Charlottetown, Acting Private Secretary to the King. Their Majesties' Medical Officer. Their Majesties' Chief Press Liaison Officer, Assistant Private Secretary to the King. The Royal Party will arrive at Province Building and will be conducted to Confederation Chamber, where the Premier will read an address from the people of Prince Edward Island, and Mayor Foster will present an address from the citizens of Charlottetown. Their Majesties will be asked to sign the Visitors' Book. Her Majesty the Queen will be asked to accept a bouquet which will be presented by the Premier's daughter. The Premier of Prince Edward Island will then present to Their Majesties the members of the Government and their wives. The Royal Party will leave Province Building and will proceed to Government House via Richmond Street to Queen, on Queen to Grand, on Grand to Prince, on Prince to Fitzroy and Great George, on Great George to Kent, on Kent to Government House.

Absence of the above should not prevent presentation. It is permissible to wear dark business suits, with white collars, grey ties and gloves and black shoes. Ladies who are to be presented—Long afternoon dresses with hats. Other ladies attending reception will wear either long or short afternoon dresses. Fur capes or scarves optional. Invitations to the garden party are being issued to those who have called regularly at Government House. Additional information regarding details of arrangements made will be released from time to time as information is available and the various activities are approved.

GRADUATES ADDRESSED BY FIN. MINISTER

(By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, May 25—Present day problems and difficulties "are the real pathways opportunity in every walk of life," Finance Minister Dunning told graduating students today at the annual convocation exercises of McGill University. More than 500 students and six prominent persons closely associated with the public life of Canada, received degrees or diplomas at the colorful ceremony in the hall of the campus fronting the University's engineering building. In addition to Mr. Dunning, who delivered the baccalaureate address, five other persons received honorary degrees: Lady Tweedsmuir, Mrs. Rev. Arthur Carlisle, Bishop of Montreal, W.A.F. Heburn, Scottish educationalist who served as chairman of the Quebec Protestant education survey committee, Baron Robert Silvercruz, Belgian Minister to Canada, and Mr. Dunning received the degree of doctor of laws. An honorary degree of doctor of science was conferred upon Sir Frederick Banting, co-discoverer of insulin.

Will Salvage Russian Plane

MISCOO ISLAND, N. B., May 25—Three officials of the Amtorg Corporation arrived here today from New York to salvage the Russian monoplane which crashed up here April 23 on a projected flight from Moscow to New York. If possible the plane will be repaired and flown to Halifax for dismantlement and shipment to Russia. Otherwise it will be dismantled here and shipped to Halifax by rail. The officials, D. J. Tchigenko, M. S. Smitchenko and P. Janson, were accompanied by W. T. Caldwell, manager of the Canadian Car and Foundry Co. Amherst, N. S., and R. T. McCully, Montreal. Since its forced landing the big monoplane has been guarded by Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

DECLARATION DAY RETURNS INCOMPLETE

Second District Of Queens Still In Doubt—Deputy Returning Officers To Be Called In. MacLeod were re-elected. Reports covering other phases of the year's work were given by Dr. J. A. Clark, property committee chairman, S. A. McLeod, Cundall Home committee chairman, R. L. Cotton, purchasing committee chairman, Mrs. Leith Wright, president-elect of the Ladies Aid reported for her organization while Mr. J. A. Clark retiring president spoke briefly. Mr. S. A. McLeod, Dr. Clark and Mr. George W. MacLeod, members of the trustee board and Miss Anna Mair, superintendent of nurses at the hospital spoke in terms of praise of the valuable work done by the Ladies Aid. Mrs. H. J. Gordon, president of the League of Mercy told of the work her organization was trying to do in a small way to assist the hospital. A vote of thanks was extended for the use of St. Paul's Hall for the meeting, to the press and to all who in any way assisted in the hospital directly or indirectly during the past year. Ready For Any Eventuality

PARIS, May 25—Finance Minister Reynaud, announcing today the consolidation of 6,000,000,000 francs (\$159,000,000) of French short term loans flooded in other countries into a six-year loan at reduced interest rates, said tonight France's finances are "ready for any eventuality." In a nationwide broadcast, the Finance Minister declared conversion of the loans would enable France to meet her increased armaments costs without fear of money shortage. He announced that the 6,000,000,000 franc national defence loan opened May 15 had been oversubscribed by 4,000,000,000 francs. Reynaud said he had signed financial contracts yesterday with bankers of The Netherlands and Switzerland consolidating the short term loans into the six-year obligations. Interest rates on the loans were reduced to seven per cent, he said.

City Hospital Graduates Listen To Address By Rev. Dr. R. Ellsworth. Five graduates of the Charlottetown Hospital School of Nursing received diplomas from the hand of His Excellency Right Rev. J. A. O'Sullivan, Bishop of the diocese at exercises held in the Holy Name Hall last night. Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, of the Hospital staff presided. Young ladies receiving diplomas included Catherine Marcella O'Hanley, St. Peter's; Mary Frances Cullen, Charlottetown; Margaret Kathleen Shrean, Kinkora; Joanne MacDonald, Pisiquid; and Mary Vivian Croken, Kinkora. Miss O'Hanley was valedictorian. Address to graduating nurses was given by Rev. Father R. Ellsworth, D. D., of the staff of St. Dunstan's University. At the close of the program His Excellency spoke briefly congratulating the graduates on their success and paying tribute to their splendid work. He stressed the nobility of their calling and urged them to continue their studies if they intended to remain in the nursing profession, otherwise in a few years they would find they were being outstripped in professional knowledge by more recent graduates. Hon. Dr. MacMillan in opening remarks reminded the audience it was sixty years since the Charlottetown Hospital opened its doors to suffering humanity and since a humble beginning in a small house in 1879 the institution had grown. In 1921 a new building was opened and so greatly had the volume of work increased that in the past two years the capacity of the institution was taxed to the utmost. The School of Nursing in connection with the hospital was established in 1921. Dr. MacMillan said and the first class of nurses graduated in 1923. Defence Budget Submitted

MOSCOW, May 25—A defence budget of 40,885,000,000 rubles (approximately \$7,727,265,000) for 1939 was submitted tonight to the Supreme Soviet—parliament—for ratification. It includes both army and navy expenditures. Last year's budget was 27,000,000,000 rubles (about \$3,349,000,000). Finance Commissar Arseni Zvereff who announced the figure said: "There is no power that the Soviet people, led by the Communist Party and the great Stalin, cannot crush." Deputies cheered his statement.

Law Cost Him Couple Of Millions

WASHINGTON, May 25—(AP)—Jack Dempsey, the Old Manassa mauler, unleashed some punches today at a 21-year-old United States law that he said had cost him "a couple of million dollars." The former world's heavyweight fight champion was "main attraction" at a Senate interstate commerce subcommittee hearing on a bill to legalize interstate transportation of prize fight films. In opening his testimony, Dempsey observed that boxing now was legalized in most of the 48 states and added: "I can't see why it becomes a crime to transport fight pictures." The public is entitled to see them, motion pictures were taken of all his major fights, Dempsey added, estimating that his share of the profit from them would have been "a couple of million dollars" if they could have been freely transported and exhibited.

GOVT. ACCEPTS PACT IN PRINCIPLE

Britain Will Send More Detailed Proposals To Russia In A Few Days. (By The Canadian Press) LONDON, May 25—The Government notified Russia today of its acceptance in principle of a mutual assistance pact linking the Soviet with the Anglo-French anti-aggression front and prepared to send more detailed proposals for operation of the pact in a few days. While details of the proposals were not announced, responsible quarters said they included:— 1. A mutual assistance pact which would come into operation in the event of direct aggression upon the European territories of any one of the three signatories. (A conflict between Russia and Japan would be outside the scope of such a pact). 2. Provision for consultation in the event of direct aggression upon territories of any state guaranteed by the three signatories. 3. Consultations among general staffs of the three powers to ensure efficient collaboration if the signatories were called into action. Which states would receive aid from the three powers has not yet been determined. This was one of the "details" to which Prime Minister Chamberlain referred yesterday as not yet cleared up. He expressed a belief that no difficulties likely would arise. It was expected that guarantees of Rumania, Poland and Greece, already pledged by Britain and France, as well as the British mutual assistance agreement with Turkey, would be covered by terms of the new tripartite pact. Official circles here suggested the pact might be used to put new life in the League of Nations. According to these sources, the anti-aggression bloc, which would be strengthened materially with the inclusion of Russia, might eventually extend to the collective security principle to other continents, thus strengthening the League's power to deal with aggression.

King And Queen Visit Regina Citizens And Farmers Participate In Great Welcome To Their Majesties.

Carnegie, Canadian Press Staff Writer) REGINA, May 25—King George sat with Queen Elizabeth in Saskatchewan's legislative building today and paid tribute to the courage of the men and women who defied years of drought so they might continue to play an important part in the production of Canada's rich grain crop. His Majesty, replying in writing to an address of welcome from Lieutenant-Governor A. P. McNab, also expressed the "earnest hope that the people of Saskatchewan, with that energy and determination by which they have so effectively settled this central portion of the great western plain, may move onward to a continually expanding prosperity, and an even wider diffusion of well being and happiness." The reply to the Lieutenant-Governor's welcome and assurance of Saskatchewan's loyalty to the Crown, was handed by His Majesty to the Speaker of the Legislature, Charles Agar who introduced legislative members and their wives to the royal visitors. Again the royal couple received a tremendous ovation as they left the legislature for tea at the Royal Canadian Mounted Police bar. They waved and smiled at a large group of silent Indians standing among over-all-clad farmers. (BY SAM G. BOSS Canadian Press Staff Writer) CALGARY, Alta., May 25—(CP)—Ten-gallon hats, bright shirts and decorations appeared in Calgary tonight as southern Alberta prepared to welcome King George and Queen Elizabeth tomorrow. Their Majesties' first stop after crossing the Saskatchewan-Alberta boundary will be Medicine Hat where Canadian and United States children will line the railway station platform to cheer them. A two-hour visit will be made at Calgary and the night will be spent at Banff, in the Rocky Mountains. Visitors were arriving early in Calgary. Accommodation was scarce and everything was hustle and bustle. Eighth Avenue—the city's main thoroughfare—was a busy place. The boys from ranches in the southern foothills have started to arrive, wearing their big sombreros. Some were old and battered. A few were new. The bright-colored shirts and the garb of the cowboys on holiday were spotted and the holiday spirit went with them. Trains arriving at Medicine Hat and Calgary brought the first flow of excited visitors from ranches and farms but the real influx will come tomorrow when special trains and buses, carrying school children and adults, pull into the stations. Medicine Hat, where Their Majesties make a 15-minute stop was decorated in lively style with flags and bunting of red, white and blue. Mayor Hector Lang will voice the civic greeting at an informal ceremony at the station. In Calgary Their Majesties will be presented with a civic address. The city hall and its lawns, deep green after welcome rain, is gayly decorated.

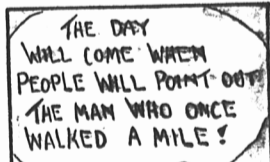
