The telegrams on page seven were sent to D. Pottenger and D. A. McKinnon, Ottawa on Saturday.

Two eloquent sermons were preached in Zion church yesterday by Rev. M. H. McIntosh of Cavendish. Mr. McIntosh leaves shortly for the West.

THE change in the time table of the Eastern Steamship Company goes into effect on March 18th, the steamers leaving St. John, Wednesdays at 8 a. m., Atlantic time for Eastport, Lubec, Portland and Boston, returning from Boston direct via Eastport and Lubec Mondays and Fridays at 8.15 a. m.

THERE was another very large audience at the Y. M. C. A. Hall yesterday afternoon to hear Rev. G. M. Young speak on Gambling—the third of the destructive forces in the series on the Making of Manhood. The reverend gentleman's discourse was exceptionally forceful and dealt with the buying of stocks on margins, betting and card playing. The address dealing with those questions will be published in full in The Guardian tomorrow.

J. SWEET, a commercial man representing Lever Bros. Ltd., soap manufacturers and well known in Charlottetown, who arrived in St. John several days ago and has since been confined to his room, was taken to the isolation hospital early Thursday morning, his case having been diagnosed as smallpox. His case is not thought to be a serious one. He had been travelling in Nova Scotia and P. E. Island and was recently in Woodstock. Mr. Sweet is a Toronto man.

CAPTAIN McLEAN of the Princess returned Saturday afternoon from a month's pleasure trip to the principal cities of the United States. The Captain is looking well and feels excellent after his tour. In conversation with The Guardian he expressed surprise at the mildness of the weather and the absence of snow which contrasted greatly with Philadelphia and other American cities where the thermometer ranged around the zero point. From Boston to St. John the trip on the St. Croix was a very stormy one and the worst experienced for a long time.

J. FRED FRASER, of Davis and Fraser, crossed to the island by the Capes Saturday and proceeded to Georgetown in order to make arrangements for disposing of the large quantity of pork which the firm has at that port awaiting shipment. Mr. Fraser left Sydney on Thursday at noon and reached Halifax that night at twelve o'clock, midnight, Friday afternoon at four he left for Cape Tormentine and in order to make connections drove from Amherst to Tormentine—a distance of forty miles, between nine o'clock Friday night and four on Saturday morning. Mr. Fraser reports good wheeling between Amherst and Cape Tormentine though there is still some frost in the ground.

JOHN CALLAGHAN, who was sentenced to twelve months imprisonment on November 14th last for larceny of copper from Dodd & Rogers made his escape Saturday from the jail yard. It appears that John in company with a number of others who are registered at the same institution were out in the yard, employed in the heedful exercise of loading coal in carts for the Asylum. As the gate-keeper was opening the gate to let one of the carts out, Callaghan slipped up behind him, and dived out between the keeper and the cart. It is not known where Callaghan has gone, at least not by the authorities. It was just four months Saturday since Callaghan received his sentence. The only wonder is that the other prisoners who were in the yard did not take advantage of the opening afforded them to sniff the pure air of freedom.

MUNICIPAL BUILDINGS BURNED.

PORT WILLIAM, March 10.—Fire this morning destroyed the municipal buildings and municipal telephone plant and central office. The loss is placed at \$18,000 on the building, with insurance of \$13,000; the loss on the telephone plant \$6,000, fully insured. The fire started from the switchboard in the telephone office.

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REV. J. L. MINER SAYS FAREWELL

To His Congregation at the Baptist Church Last Night.

After a Pastorate of Fourteen and a Half Months He Leaves Amid the Sorrows of His People, His Last Words.

BEFORE an audience that filled every seat in the Baptist Church last night, the Pastor bade an affectionate farewell to his Church and congregation.

Following is the report of Capt. Finlayson to Mr. Lord Saturday: Minto at edge of ice, with clear open water to the south. With south or west winds steamer is safe, and north or north east winds will drive her ashore. Will strongly urge that some steamer be sent to tow her. Would suggest S S Melgrave, now available at Hawkesbury. Do not think it possible for Newfoundland to get here from St. Pauls Island as the ice here is very solid to the north. At weather last few days has weakened considerably.

CAPT. BROWN'S REPORT.

Capt. Brown's report is as follows: The Stanley is still in the same pack of ice. We have been cutting for the past nine days, and have the ship moved sixty feet. We found 5 to 6 feet of solid ice about her. We have to saw and haul the ice out on the ice. It is almost impossible to do it. Have 40 men and one horse at work. Weather soft, we hope to get to get out by 1st April. You can report to the department that we are doing everything to have ship cut out. I don't know whether the dynamite will be any good or not. We will see. It will be better now as the ice will not freeze up again after it is broken.
