Directions For Shipping Fox Skins to C. M. LAMPSON & CO. Per Parcel Post

Fox skins intended for C. M. Lampson & Co.'s London Sales should be packed in parcels weighing not over 11 lbs., the outer covering of which should be of an unbleached muslin or similar material; and the following address should be plainly marked on the outside of the package:—

C. M. LAMPSON & CO., 64 Queen Street, London, E. C. 4, England.

In addition, the shipper's name and address should be placed on the outside of the package to enable Lampson & Co. to identify it on arrival, and packages should be numbered consecutively from No. 1 upwards.

At the time the shipment is dispatched, an invoice must in every case be sent to Lampson & Co. and a duplicate to Alfred Fraser. This invoice should state:—

- (1) The number of parcels sent forward.
 - (2) The serial number marked on each parcel.
 - (3) The quantity of skins in each parcel.
 - (4) The value of each skin.
 - (5) The amount of insurance required.
- Unless advised to the contrary, Lampson & Co. will insure, under their own policies, all shipments while in transit for invoice value plus 10 per cent. These policies give protection from the time the goods leave the shipper's possession until delivered to Lampson & Co. in London, and the rate of premium is most reasonable.
- If it is not desired that Lampson & Co. should arrange insurance, it must in every case be clearly stated on the invoice referred to above.
- Skins may also be forwarded to London through one of the express companies. Shipments by express should be made in exactly the same way as by parcel post, except that the packages need not weigh less than 11 lbs. It is not necessary so far as the insurance is concerned to declare any value to the express companies.

Exiled Emperor Retains Dignity

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Just like Potsdam" is the impression of the former Kaiser's life at Doorn, brought back by the Rt. Hon. Alexander Carlisle, 71 year old friend of the Kaiser, who has just spent a week-end at Doorn. Carlisle, who is a member of King George's Privy Council and former head of the famous Belfast ship-building firm of Harland and Wolff, has been known as an intimate friend of the former German Emperor, though the friendship ceased during the war. Carlisle is a militant Orangeman, an ultra-British patriot.

He announced before his visit that he would be purely personal in character. Following Foreign Secretary Chamberlain's marked exchange of loving cup and compliments with the German Ambassador at the Lord Mayor's banquet. In his return Carlisle emphasized the personal nature of the conversation, but consented to talk of the regal state of Potsdam which the Kaiser still keeps up. "You can picture us at dinner Sunday night," he said. "It was a most stately affair. Even in the old Berlin days there was, not more ceremony."

Uniformed and Decorated. "The Kaiser was in glittering uniform; decorations and medals gleamed on his breast. The Kaiser's dress was magnificent. Indeed, staff were in uniform. I sat on the Kaiser's right. Next to me was the stately Lord Chamberlain. "The Kaiser and I talked about all sorts of things—his visits to London, the war, the yellow peril, the nature of the Empire, the present state of the time talking to him. He looked even younger than when I last saw him in 1913, and that in spite of his white hair, which becomes him well. He talked with all his old enthusiasm, saying: "I always have had friendly feelings toward England. I am attached to England by family ties. I am confident that if honest diplomacy had been used and if certain members of the Cabinet had visited Germany before the World War, things would have been very different. To some extent it was a war of lawyers, and I have always disliked lawyers."

"Talkin' of England's future the Kaiser said: "I think her future is terribly insecure. Her financial burden would appear intolerable. She has to pay out millions to the United States every year, whereas her Allies are not paying their debts to her. "Danger to the World. "Regarding the yellow peril the Kaiser said gravely: "The great danger to the future of England and of the world lies in the East. "Talking of Margot, Asquith reminded him of an amusing incident which occurred during his first State visit to England: "I used to ride in Rotten Row (Hyde Park, London) every morning from half past eight till nine o'clock," the Kaiser said with a reminiscence. "One morning a lady on a horseback dashed up against my horse, knocking my foot from the stirrup. I sent one of my aides after her to make inquiries and she came back blushing and begged my pardon. That evening King Edward said to me: "So you met Mrs. Montagu in the Row after all. She made a bet last night she would introduce herself to you." "Carlisle said he was met at Utrecht by the Kaiser's Lord Chamberlain and two aides, and travelled in a motorcade to Doorn, which is not a palace, perhaps, but is luxuriously furnished. "I was presented to the Kaiser in the afternoon," Carlisle continued. "He stood erect in uniform and greeted me vivaciously. Then I met the Kaiserin and her two daughters; she is a charming woman and they are delightful girls. The Kaiserin is devoted to her husband and he is most happy in

There is also a rumor, which is believed in Belfast, that the Prince, after laying the corner stone, will make an official visit to the Free State. No confirmation of this rumor is obtainable.

Career of Deceit Halted By Prison Term For Poseur

NEW YORK, December, 11.—Anthony Gascoyne Young, a civilian clerk in the Post Office in London, England during the war, but who had posed as an honorary colonel in the British army and a freeman of the city of London was sentenced today by Judge Talley in General Sessions, to an indefinite term in the penitentiary for his part of guilty to a forgery charge. The maximum sentence is three years, but Judge Talley ordered that upon his release from the institution he immediately be deported and kept out of this country for ever. Young admitted that he forged the name of Charles Behat, director of the Producers' Distributing Corporation to letters in July last, on which he obtained loans of \$925. The letters represented that Mr. Behat had promised to pay Young \$12,000 for the right to produce a motion picture from Young's book, "Kathleen's Love." It developed that he had privately published the book through borrowed funds.

Young had surrounded himself with much importance when he was arrested. He said that he was a prominent barrister in London, but in a report submitted to Judge Talley by Edwin Cooley, chief of the criminal probation bureau in New York, it was revealed that while he had been admitted as a barrister of the middle Temple Inn a short time before the war, he never had gained any prominence in the legal profession there. He was born in Bombay India.
