EASTERN FERMINUS ON ATLANTIC

The Grand Trunk Pacific is Said to be Planning

TO EFFECT PURCHASES

Of the Quebec Bridge Under Construction and Several of the Quebec Railway Lines.

There is no doubt that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway line will have its eastern end on the Atlantic coast.

The eastern end of the transcontinental railway project is being just as seriously planned as the western section, about which there has been so much said.

Another feature of the project is the fact that when it is completed it will be found that the new Quebec bridge across the St. Lawrence is a part of the system.

THE QUEBEC BRIDGE. The substructure of the Quebec bridge has been completed by Mr. M. P. Davis at a cost of about \$2,500,000.

The financing of a four and a half million dollar enterprise is not the easiest matter in the world, and while the present company feels itself perfectly able to carry the project through, it has been found that the plan can be carried to a more successful issue by co-operating with the new Grand Trunk Pacific.

LINE NORTH OF MONTREAL.

Another new feature of the Grand Trunk Pacific is a plan to construct a line to Quebec from the Great Lakes, passing through this province to the north of Montreal, but stopping in this city by a branch line.

It may be mentioned that they have not by any means a monopoly of this opinion. They merely share it with Messrs. Mackenzie & Mann, and with the Trans-Canada Railway Company, both of whom have had the project in hand for several months.

The great advantage of this route is that it furnishes a much shorter route between Quebec and the Lakes than any of the lines existing at the present time.

RIGHTS OF THOSE COMPANIES.

The determination of the Grand Trunk Pacific to pass through the northern portion of this province and continue to the Atlantic coast to a seaport would mean that the company proposes to build or acquire lines from the Atlantic to the Pacific, entirely distinct from the present Grand Trunk system, and extending across the continent entirely in Canadian territory.

To reach the Atlantic coast from Quebec it is intended to acquire the rights of three companies. The first of these is the Quebec and New Brunswick, projected from Quebec to Connors' Station, in New Brunswick; the Quebec and Oriental, projected from Connors' Station to Metapedia, a town on the Intercolonial Railway, and finally the Atlantic and Lake Superior Railway, which has been built and is being operated from Metapedia to Paspébiac on the Baie du Chaleur.

IN DIFFERENT STAGES.

These three companies which are to furnish the route to the sea are in three different stages. The Quebec and New Brunswick has received its charter and has been guaranteed subsidies. The Quebec and Oriental is applying for a provincial charter. The Atlantic and Lake Superior has been built and bankrupt, and is now being operated by the bondholders.

The Quebec and New Brunswick will cover about 160 miles of the route, the Quebec and Oriental about 115, and the Atlantic and Lake Superior 110.

There are some advantages in the line as planned from Quebec to Paspébiac, and some disadvantages. It traverses a country which has great resources, and will some day furnish local business which will make the railway a paying proposition of the biggest kind.

The disadvantage is chiefly in the fact that in the months of February and March there is too much ice in the Gulf of St. Lawrence to permit steamers getting into Paspébiac. It is the winter time that a port is wanted on the Atlantic coast, as the shipping business of the summer is bound to be done from the ports of Mont-

real and Quebec. However, with a route as far to the east as the present projection, it is not believed for a moment that the Grand Trunk Pacific is going to stop until it gets well into the Maritime Provinces, where there are any number of good ports for winter work.
