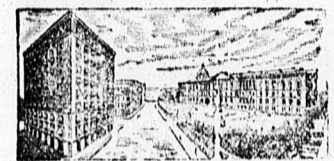

London, April 4—Sir Edward Grey indicated in the House of Commons today that the British Government contemplates asking the United States to accord Great Britain the reduced duties granted to Canada under the Canadian-American reciprocity agreement. Replying to the critics who sought to draw him again into the much discussed subject, the Foreign Secretary said that he was unable at present to make a definite statement but added significantly: "There are complicated points involved in the question of the most favored nation treatment, now under examination. These must be settled before I can say what step we shall take in laying our view of the matter before the United States Government."
PARIS, April 4—At a meeting today of Joint Commission on Customs of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies, Deputy Fichon reported that during a study of the Canadian-American reciprocity agreement he had found that the United States gave to Canada advantages not accorded to France on a variety of articles. Thereupon the Commission instructed their President to draw the attention of the Cabinet to this discrimination under the interpretation of the favored nation clause of the Franco-American treaty for examination and appropriate action.
WASHINGTON, April 4—The favored nation clause of the treaties between the United States and other treaty nations does not apply to the reciprocity agreement between this country and Canada, and it is explained today that it is merely carrying out a consistent policy of the United States in interpreting the favored nation clause of its treaties.
The trade pact between Canada and the United States is a contract, or bargain, by which each country makes certain concessions. Other nations, it is pointed out, cannot be given these advantages except by similar specified agreements. This principle, it is stated in official quarters, was laid down by the United States years ago when Germany claimed a favored nation treatment on sugar in connection with the reciprocity treaty with Hawaii, before that territory was annexed to the United States.

RACES FOR SOUTH POLE NOW ON IN EARNEST
MELBOURNE, April 4—The race for the South Pole turns out to be even more exciting than at first suspected. It appears that Captain Scott and Captain Amundsen landed together at Ballou Bight, and Scott learned what the plans of the Norwegian expedition were. While Scott was in the vicinity, Captain Amundsen landed a party of eight from his vessel and dispatched them southward in an endeavor to reach the Pole. The party is very poorly equipped, according to Scott, and some means of transport consisted of one dog team. No pretense is being made of any scientific observations by the Norwegians. Captain Scott thinks their chances of reaching the objective are not such that he need make a special effort to beat them in the race southward.

in a five-mile match race at Charlottetown and won easily. After finishing this race he had 15 minutes rest and entered the 100-yard dash. He won his heat, and finished third in the final.
Dr. Leadwell, formerly of the old Boston Emergency Hospital, who is now one of the leading surgeons of Prince Edward Island, saw in Thomas as a great possibility of a winner for the B. A. A. Marathon. He advised a course of training for Thomas which he has followed.
During the past winter Thomas has been running over the snow and ice, also skating at the rink at Summerside and Charlottetown to be in condition.
The tribe at Lenox gave Thomas an enthusiastic sendoff when he left Lenox to come to Boston. Chief Sark said: "You must win," and Thomas smiled and only said: "I'll try."
The fires will be lighted and there will be great feasting on the island if Thomas should come home "heep big brave."
Thomas is 24 years old, is five feet seven inches tall and weighs about 140 pounds. He has wonderful staying powers, but has never run 25 miles, although going 20 miles often.
Fred Cameron, winner of last year's Marathon, is authority for the statement that Thomas is a great runner and if he can last the 25 miles he will be well to the front if not a winner.
This week Thomas will train around Boston to get acclimated and to get acquainted with the course.
Thomas will be backed heavily by a large number of sporting men who will accompany him from his home and from the many natives of Prince Edward Island who live in and about Boston.
