Raspberry Crop About 11,000,000 qts

Reports from growers in the areas in which raspberries are grown in Canada in commercial quantities indicate that the 1940 crop will be as large as in 1939 when it totaled 10,861,000 quarts of which Ontario accounted for 5,673,000 quarts, Quebec, 2,217,000 quarts, British Columbia, 2,852,000 quarts and the Maritime Provinces 119,000 quarts. The quality of this year's raspberries is notably good. The crop is now on the market and large quantities will be available, particularly in Ontario and Quebec, until about the end of July.

Field Day Scene Shifts To Long River

The 5th of a series of Field Days organized by the Division of Illustration Stations, Dominion Experimental Farms Service in co-operation with the Prince Edward Island Department of Agriculture was held at the farm of William E. Johnston, Long River, Tuesday, Aug. 13.

Attendance at the field day was given of their attention, and enjoyed a program that was both of an interesting and educational nature.

A special feature of the day was a "Health Talk" by Miss Ina Gillian Public Health Nurse, Charlottetown. Miss Gillian is to be commended for the splendid manner in which she held the attention of her audience.

The policy of the Division was reviewed by Black, Supervisor of Illustration Stations. Mr. Peppin gave a detailed description of the demonstration tests and experiments in progress at this station.

Mr. S. G. Peppin, District Inspector Seed Potato Certification, strongly advised potato growers to plant nothing but No. 1 disease-free seed, and to rotate their fields early. Mr. Peppin further stressed the importance of disease-free potatoes and the disease plays in the marketing of seed stock.

An address on "Bacterial Ringrot of Potatoes" by G. W. Avers, Junior Plant Pathologist, Experimental Station, Charlottetown, was a feature of the program. The symptoms of this disease, means of dissemination, and measures of control were topics dealt with by the speaker.
