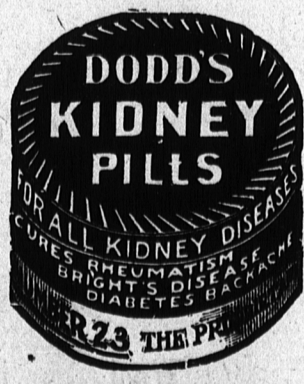
## Quiet Week In House of Commons

## MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

At Charlottetown and within the hall of Zion Church there on Tuesday the fourth day of April, nineteen hundred and sixteen, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon.

Which place and time the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted.  
Mr. Archibald Sutherland, Moderator pro-tempore, with whom were present Messrs Dr. Fullerton, A. J. MacNeill, MacHattie, A. B. McLeod, Taylor and Irvine, Ministers; Messrs Campbell and McLean elders.

Mr. G. W. Irvine was appointed Clerk pro-tempore. The object of the meeting was to consider the proposed union of Clyde River with West River. Messrs Campbell and Brown represented Brookfield and Hunter River. Messrs MacMillan and Murchison were the representatives of Clyde River and Messrs Lowther, McLean and Stewart were the representatives from West River. After these representatives had spoken on behalf of their congregation it was moved by Dr. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. Taylor and unanimously carried that:

"This Presbytery having heard all parties concerned agrees to sever Clyde River from Brookfield and Hunter River, and to unite it with West River, and instruct the clerk to intimate the same to all the parties with certification that objections if any will be considered at a meeting held in this place on the eighteenth instant at eleven o'clock forenoon. It was moved by Dr. Fullerton, seconded by Mr. Taylor and carried that this Presbytery apply to the augmentation Committee for a grant of Four Hundred Dollars for Brookfield and Hunter River, to date from May 1st. On motion of Mr. MacNeill, seconded by Mr. Taylor, Dr. Fullerton was appointed Moderator of the application on behalf of Brookfield and Hunter River, before the augmentation Committee.

As Dr. Fullerton intimated to the Presbytery that he would not be present at the General Assembly it was agreed that Messrs Sutherland, Taylor and A. MacKay support of the resolution which was approved at the March meeting before the Assembly.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the same place on Tuesday, April the eighteenth at eleven o'clock forenoon. Of which public intimation was made and this sedentary closed with the benediction.

## NINE KILLED WHEN SHIP WAS TORPEDOED.

MALTA, Via. London, April 9.—One engineer and eight lascars of the crew of the steamship Chantala were killed when the vessel was sunk by a submarine. Ninety-two survivors were rescued and landed here. They declare they had no warning of the impending attack.  
The sinking of the Chantala, a vessel of 4,949 tons gross, which sailed from London, March 10, for Calcutta, was reported yesterday in a dispatch received by Lloyds at London.
