YOUNG BOY DIES FROM SERIOUS BURNS

NEW YORK, April 12—As he recovered consciousness just before he died in the Harlem Hospital, yesterday morning, from burns which he had received at a fire in his home, a few hours earlier, William Williams, Jr., 7 years old, blessed himself and was praying as he breathed his last.

The scene was too much for the surgeon and nurses who had gathered about the cot and they turned away with tears in their eyes. In the excitement which followed the discovery of the fire on the ground floor of the four story tenement house at Third avenue, the boy lost his father and mother and started to return to their rooms when he was overcome by the smoke in the hallway.

PAUPER DEAD; RELATION TO GREAT NOVELIST

DENVER, April 12—The Denver Post today asserts that Philip Caine, known as the "shoe lace" man, because of his having existed for years by the sale of shoe laces and who died last November in ignorance of the fact that he had been made heir to a fortune of \$60,000, was the cousin of Hall Caine, the novelist.

Philip Caine lived the life of a recluse in Denver and none knew that he was a relative of Hall Caine until, it is asserted, the relationship was established a short time ago by attorneys engaged in the settlement of the estate of John Caine, a brother of Philip, who before his death was a resident of the Isle of Man. The Isle of Man is the home of Hall Caine.

CRITICIZES BIBLE IN HIS NEW BOOK

CHICAGO, April 12—Higher criticism of the Bible, more startling at many points than that advanced by Professor George B. Foster, is voiced by Professor Henry B. Sherman, instructor in New Testament history and literature in the University of Chicago Divinity School, in a book on "The Teaching of Jesus About the Future," issued today from the university press.

Professor Sherman, in an exhaustive consideration of the gospel of Matthew, Mark and Luke, repeats much of the contents of these books to what he considers garbled reports of Christ's sayings, false interpretations of Christ's views by outside influences, false messengers concerning future life and future punishment and unauthentic tales of Christ's life.

That Jesus did not preach the doctrine of "heaven" and "hell," and the "day of judgment," and did not commission his disciples to preach the gospel, are among the professor's assertions. He divides the material of the synoptic gospel into "what Jesus probably said," "what the earliest editors of the gospel thought he said," or "what later editors thought best to represent him as saying."

MAKE COLLAR BUTTONS OUT OF SKIM MILK

NEW YORK, April 12—There seems to be no limit to the ingenuity of the Germans. Not content with making butter and cheese out of milk they have devised a method whereby not only collar buttons can be made from skim milk, but piano keys, dominoes, dice and chess figures also. Galalith is the magical substance. It is derived from the casein of milk. Casein is also used in making paper, glue and color. The best comes from France.

The headquarters for the galalith industry is Hamburg, where it has flourished since 1902. The Hamburg galalith makers contract with French butter makers for skim milk at the rate of 30 cents for 220 pounds, they stipulating to return the whey to the butter makers.

The skim milk is coagulated with rennet by the dairymen. When the curds have been pressed until they contain about 60 per cent of water they are shipped to Germany for the fishing process, by which they are fashioned into blocks and tubes. It takes more than 3,000 quarts of skim milk to make 220 pounds of dry casein. That quantity is worth \$15.50.

Our Consul General at Hamburg, Robert R. Skinner, says that to set up a plant large enough to make one ton of galalith a day (exclusive of the cost of land, buildings and working capital, stock and special machinery) would require about \$300,000. The Hamburg factory employs 200 operatives and produces about 800 tons of galalith a year.
