

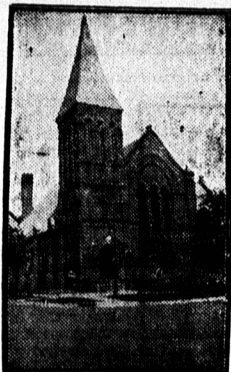

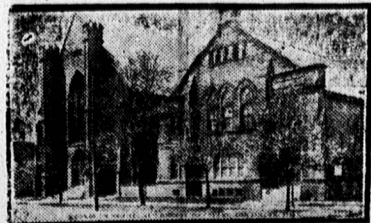

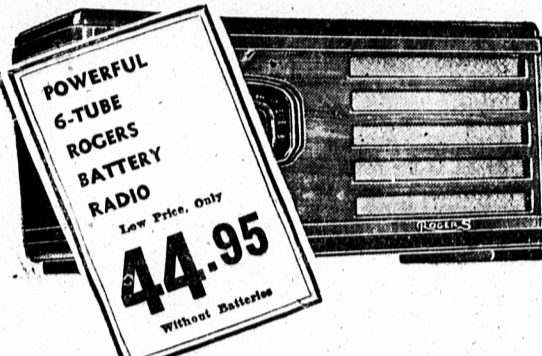

Induction Of Rev. Mr. Detlor At Clifton

A large congregation attended the induction service for the Rev. W. L. Detlor in the New London Presbyterian Church, Thursday evening. The service was conducted by Rev. Hughes, Moderator of the Presbytery. A splendid spirit of worship and a genuine public interest made the service impressive. The sermon was preached by Rev. Fred Williamson who took his text from Acts 10, 32. He pointed to the illustration of the Jew's abiding with a lowly tanner as representative of Christ's power to remove barriers among men. The Moderator called upon Rev. W. O. Rhoad to narrate the steps leading up to the call. When Rev. Mr. Detlor had been duly inducted and the pledge given to the congregation, the Moderator invited the Ministers of Presbytery to extend the right hand of fellowship to their new associate. Rev. John McNeill of Marshfield delivered the charge to the minister being able to address one who had not long ago been his college friend. The duty of the minister must ever be to divide the word of truth unto the people. In this capacity, said Mr. McNeill, the servant of Christ is a workman who sheweth himself approved unto God. The address to the congregation was given by Rev. Wallace Wadland of Belfast, who stressed the importance of having the spirit of Christ to stand in the midst of all church relationships. A congregation and minister must be gathered together in Jesus' name if the blessing of God is expected. Mr. Hughes pointed out to the congregation that the service had been unusual for the number of young ministers concerned. Four of these had been at one and the same time students in the Montreal and Toronto universities. At the close of the service the congregation welcomed the minister and his wife. Members of Presbytery were grateful to the ladies of the congregation who had prepared sumptuous repasts in the Manse. Everyone felt that the excellent spirit which had prevailed throughout the whole evening augured well for the future of the parish.
