Canada's Tennis Player Ability

Unknown Quantity

MONTREAL, Jan. 17—(CP)—
A wide-open competition among
players unknown before the war
and veterans past their prime is
expected for places on Canada's
1946 Davis Cup team.
Rarely in the past has the call-
bre of the Dominion's tennis play-
ers been such an unknown quan-
tity. Lack of wartime competi-
tion and entry into the services of
the men who wielded the most potent
rackets before the war are the
reasons.
Canada entered a team in the
1944 tournament first since 1939
with a view to encouraging young
players rather than with any idea
of making a name for the Domini-
on in the tennis world. It is on
the waiting juniors that hopes for
the future are being built.
Looking over the field it ap-
pears that Eastern Canada has
the best selection of players but
the Pacific Coast usually turns
out at least one and sometimes
two men of Davis Cup calibre.
Vancouver had Phil Pearson and
the late Bill Pedlar on the 1939
team.
How the newcomers will stack
up against the men who were big
names in Canadian tennis from
six to 10 years ago remains to be
seen. It will take provincial
tournaments and possibly a Domini-
on tournament to find out.
Montreal has three up-and-
coming players who might easily
prove to be of Davis Cup rank:
Henri Rochon, Evren Macken and
J. Desjardins were tops around
here in junior ranks and with Ot-
tawa's Bobby Dufort are just about
the class of young players in the
east.
Vancouver has a highly rated
junior in 16-year-old Lorne Main.
This youngster isn't known in the
State but he won the Washington
State junior title and according to
experts here that puts him in a
class, at most, by himself.
