An Ottawa despatch intimates that Senator Burpee of New Brunswick is likely soon to resign his seat and that Mr. J. V. Ellis, M. P. and editor of the St. John Globe will probably be appointed in his stead. Mr. Ellis has long stood in the front rank of Maritime Province journalism, and has had long service as a representative of the people in the Provincial Legislative Assembly and the House of Commons. His knowledge of public affairs and his ability to discuss them both on the platform and in the press are undoubted. His services to the Liberal party have been long and tireless, while his cast of mind is decidedly independent. Should such an appointment fall to his lot we have no doubt Mr. Ellis would render excellent service to the Dominion as a Senator.

Not very much has appeared in the press outside of Quebec in commendation of Hon. Mr. Tarte as Canada's principal representative at the Paris Exposition. Most newspaper readers are, on the contrary familiar with a great deal of hostile criticism of Mr. Tarte in that connection. But just now we find the Minister of Public Works commended from an unexpected quarter. Dr. Oronbyatekha, head of the I. O. Foresters is widely known as a pronounced Conservative in politics, and he volunteers the statement that he "cannot commend too highly the work Mr. Tarte is doing at the Exposition. He is doing a lot for Canada. Mr. Tarte is a thorough Canadian." This is high praise and as we have said it comes from an unexpected and disinterested quarter.

A Shanghai despatch tells that some months ago the Empress Dowager of China entered into secret negotiations with the Mikado of Japan with a view to concerted action for driving all Europeans and Americans out of the east and dividing the territory from Burmah to Siberia between China and Japan. This may be a piece of imagination merely, for Shanghai is a fruitful source of misinformation, but it gives us a glimpse of a very perplexing and alarming possibility. There is, even in England, some fear of Japan as well as of China. Japan is aggressive as well as progressive, and there is almost as much fear of Japan as of Russia obtaining too much control on the eastern mainland of Asia.

France is now taking the initiative among the powers, it is said, to prevent the further sale of arms and munitions of war to China. The fact is that Europe has armed China, and prepared the Orientals for warfare on modern principles. Surprise was expressed a few weeks ago when the allied forces were met by Chinese infantry armed with the best modern repeating rifles and artillery which outranged the cannon of the allies. All these rifles and cannon had been supplied by enterprising French and German manufacturers, just as the Chinese battleships and cruisers had been built in British yards.

The esteemed Examiner is very hard to please these times, and the reason is sufficiently obvious. It is not even satisfied when, for one day only, THE GUARDIAN was able to commend its moderation. And it forthwith becomes violent and unreasonable again.

Enormous as has been the increase in the United States, the Canadian increase, in view of the relative populations of the Dominion and the Republics, quite two to one.

WORLD'S CONVENTION.

Fifty Thousand Persons Take Part in Proceedings.

LONDON, July 19.—Fully 50,000 persons attended Wednesday's meetings of the world's convention of the young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, special features of the program being the delivery of the messages from the churches. The Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, president of the Wesleyan conference, said he conveyed from 30,000,000 Methodists of Great Britain the desire to form an alliance with every true soldier of Christ.

The Right Rev. Mandell Creighton, bishop of London, extended to the Christian Endeavor society the heartiest welcome of his diocese, and assurance of the sympathy with this work of the large body of Christians he represented.

Dr. Parker, of the City Temple, urged American Christian Endeavorers to nominate Rev. Francis E. Clark and the Rev. Charles M. Sheldon for the highest offices in the United States, as Christian men should be at the head of things.

Stock Notes.

Bicycle for National Defence.

The value of the bicycle as a means of national defence will be demonstrated next month in England in manoeuvres lasting three days. There are upwards of 1,000,000 bicycles in England, and Major Gen. Sir Frederick Maurice, who has given much thought to the bicycle in military campaigning, believes that if a "moderate" proportion of these were skilled in the use of a rifle, they could hold back an invading force until other troops could be got ready to meet the enemy. The object of such an invading force, would of course, be London. That city is comparatively near the coast and an enemy might come within striking distance in a short time. Gen. Maurice's plan involves the distribution of 2,000 bicyclists on each road leading from the coast of London. Each body will be divided into six parts of 300 members each and the remaining 200 will be utilized to carry ammunition, prepare quarters and cook. Gen. Maurice believes that all the roads which an invading army would be likely to take could be successfully guarded until regular troops could be brought up. Bicycle corps would be and they might serve a very useful purpose in the way Gen. Maurice points out. The manoeuvres next month will be watched with interest by military men the world over.

A LONG SIEGE

That of Gibraltar Breaks the Record of Modern Times.

Although by no means the most terrible, the last siege of Gibraltar, when the Rock was held by a British garrison under General Elliot against the combined efforts of the Spaniards and French from July 5, 1779, to Nov. 26, 1781, holds the record as the longest important siege of modern times. The fact that every now and again the garrison were able to add to their provisions by successful sorties kept them from succumbing to hunger, but scurvy claimed nearly 1,000 victims.

For weeks together over 6,000 shells were thrown into the town daily. A curious point about this siege is that the governor of Gibraltar, after having done everything he could think of to strengthen the fortifications, issued a proclamation calling on any of the garrison who had any schemes to propose to call on him with them, as he did not wish the Rock to fall when by listening but a few minutes to a private individual it might be saved.

By holding the fortress of Plevna during the Russo-Turkish war from Sept. 7, 1877, to Dec. 10 against the pick of the Russian army the Turkish garrison, under Osman Pasha, accomplished the impossible, according to both military and medical experts; for not only did they defy the besieging force when it numbered nearly 50,000 against them, but they lived for 12 weeks practically without food. Yet on Dec. 10, after having eaten their last grain of rye, they sallied out and pluckily tried to cut their way through the Russians.—London Mail.

Noon-day Prayer For China

TORONTO, July 19.—The combined committee representing foreign mission committees of all the Protestant denominations in Toronto have sent out an appeal to all the people to unite in noon-day prayers on behalf of Europeans in distress in China.
