Cards Sweep Twin Bill From Cubs As Brooklyn Splits With Lowly Phillies

 PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 21.—(AP)—A couple of home run pitches at Shibe Park today stopped—at least temporarily—Brooklyn's dash toward the National League pennant. The Phillies were served up to Danny Litwiler and Nick Etten of the Phillies in the second game of a double-header and enabled the last-place Phils to gain an even split with the league-leading Philadelphia Phillies. Brooklyn won the first game 6-3 and the Phillies the second 6-3.

The twin-bill was played before 35,000—largest crowd to see a National League game in Philadelphia. An estimated 15,000 Brooklyn fans, who came by train, airplane, bus and hitch-hiked, were in the stands. Litwiler's smack off Luke Hahnlin with the bases full in the first inning of the second game was the blow that defeated the Dodgers. Etten's round-tripper with one on in the sixth came after Brooklyn had regained three runs and with Tom Drake on the mound.

Fighting to make it four straight over the Phils, the Dodgers drove starting pitcher Tom Hughes to a starting relief pitching by Ike Pearson cut short their threats in the seventh and eighth, the Brooks leaving four men stranded in those two innings. In the ninth, Brooklyn went down in order.

Making his first start since pitching 15 scoreless innings in the historic 17-inning battle at Cincinnati, Johnny Allen had an easy time shaking up his third victory in the opener.

Allen gave up only five hits—two of them homers by Ben Warren and Joe Marly—while the Phils' other tally resulted from a two-base error by Dixie Walker. Allen did not issue a base on balls and retired the Phils in order in the first, third, fourth, sixth and eighth innings.

At St. Louis the Cardinals battled their way back to within one game of the Dodgers by sweeping a double-header from Chicago Cubs, 6-5 and 7-0. The Redbirds pulled the first game out of the fire with one run in the ninth inning and Lefty Howard. Pollet, aided by timely hitting blanketed the Cubs on eight hits in the nightcap.

At Cincinnati Elmer Riddle pitched his fourth shutout of the season for the locals to beat Pittsburgh Pirates 2-0 and gain his 18th victory against four defeats—best pitching record in the league.

At New York the farm products with which the Giants figured out to be a pretty fair collection of raw material as they paced the New Yorkers to a double header victory over Boston Braves, 4-0 and 15-7.

Rookie Harry Jerome, young Jewish elbow fresh up from Jersey City International, again opened a four-hit drive in the opener and Nick Witek drove in two of the runs with a pair of singles.

Dodgers moved two games ahead of the Cardinals in the pennant race Saturday, taking two games from Phillies, 7-2 and 6-1. White Wyatt and Kirby, each won their 21st game hurling the Dodgers to victory.

Six runs in the ninth by Cubs spoiled the Cards' dream as the Cubs blasted them for a 7-5 win. In the other Saturday games Giants took a doubleheader from Braves, 4-1 and 7-3, and Reds won a twin bill against Pirates, 2-1 and 7-3.

Sox steal Yank's thunder With 4-1 win

BOSTON, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Boston Red Sox stole New York Yankees' thunder today by blasting three homers which accounted for all their runs as they won 4-1.

A crowd of 28,070, one of the largest to attend a single game at Fenway Park this season, turned out to see the American League champions in their final appearance here.

At Chicago, darkness halted a 14-inning 1-1 deadlock between Detroit and White Sox after the Tigers had captured the first game of a double header, 6-3, before 12,536 spectators.

In the brilliantly-pitched nightcap John Fisney and Schoolboy Rowe each yielded eight hits for the route, both pitching airtight ball with men on bases.

At Washington Senators scored a twin victory over Philadelphia Athletics, 6-5 and 6-2, and moved into undisputed possession of sixth place in the league, a dizzy height for the Senators.

At Cleveland St. Louis Browns and Indians traded shut-outs the Indians winning the opener 14-0 and the Brownsies taking the nightcap 3-0.

The rampaging Yankees continued their slaughter of all opposition Saturday routing Red Sox 8-1 with Joe Gordon taking the honors with a three-run homer.

Home runs by Jeff Heath and Ken Keltner helped Indians to a 6-2 victory over Browns. White Sox edged out Tigers 4-3 and Senators defeated Athletics 1-0 in the only other games scheduled.

MONTREAL, Sept. 21.—(CP)—Montreal Royals lost a chance to clinch the Governor's Cup here today largely because a hard-hit ball didn't roll quite far enough, but outfielder Jake Powell says the real trouble was that he couldn't speak French.

It was in the seventh that Tommy Holmes belted out the hit that eventually became the winning run in Newark's 4-3 decision. Because of the overflowing crowd—24,752—the fans were lined up deep around centre and left field, and a ground rule was in effect that a ball hit into the crowd would go as a double.

Holmes was racing around the bases as the ball fell close to the crowd and rolled toward them. Powell let it roll, figuring it would reach the crowd and be ruled a double. At the same time he shouted to the fans to edge out and touch the ball. But the ball stopped inches short and became a homer, and Powell figures the French-Canadian audience didn't catch his meaning, because nobody moved.
