Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alone side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years and erect a house worth \$300. Area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

AMONG THE HORSES

Longworth B. 2021, during a workout at Hughesville, Pa. ran into an automobile, breaking a front leg. The Canadian pacing mare, Queen Hal, 2054, by Gold Hal, 2122, broke her left hind leg in a race at Rockport, Ohio, a week or two ago.

Miss Densmore, 2074, by Vyzant has been sold by F. L. Wacholz, Forest City, Ia., to George Gosselin, Quebec, P. Q. Miss Densmore won over \$5,000 in this years campaign.

Ed. Burgoyne, of Vancouver, B. C., has purchased Bon Guy 2094, from J. G. von Herberg of Seattle, who was using him on a milk wagon, having bought him at Salem, Ore., for \$300.

Arion, one-time champion trotter of the world, has been given to Lister Yinterspoon, of Versailles, Ky., by holders of the castle of the late M. W. Savage. At one time Arion, now 27 years old, was sold for \$125,000. As a two-year-old, Arion trotted to the high sulky in 2:10 1/4, which still stands as a record.

There is a strong probability that there will not be a two year old stake at the Halifax fair, next year. The record is that the management has not found it profitable either to breeders or owners.

The sensation of the final day's racing at Windsor, Conn., was the track record-breaking work of Judge Ormonde, driven by Crozier, who shattered every local record. He won in straight heats in 2:08 3/4, 2:07 3/4, and 2:07 1/4. The old record for the track was 2:09 1/4, made last year by Roan Hal, Judge Ormonde defeated a fast field, including Earl Jr. Acornite, B. M., Billy Dale, Fred W. and Buster Brown.

Volga is the fifth 3-year-old by Peter the Great to win the Kentucky Futurity and her performance gives him the credit of siring the fastest 3-year-old colt, Peter Volga, 2:03 1/4; fastest 3-year-old filly, Volga, 2:04 1/4 and fastest 3-year-old gelding, Peter Thompson, 2:07 1/4. Each took their records in winning races in the Kentucky Futurity.

Some very shrewd judges early in the Grand Circuit campaign picked Busy's Lassie 2063, as a better trotter than Mabel Trask. As the season wore on Mabel's sock rose, but the opinion still holds that Cox has about as promising a 1917 prospect as any one in the bay daughter of Peter the Great. She is one of the lucky kind, having won a \$2,000 purse and one of \$1,500 on the Raging Grand and is still eligible to the 2:14 class.

Nat Ray, of Toronto, is the "Pop" Geers of the Canadian harness world. The former steeple chase jockey is the equal of the famous veteran in everything but experience, and he is no spring chicken at that. Mr. Ray has just wound up a most successful season in the sulky over the half mile tracks across the border. He drove Dayspring to victory in twelve out of thirteen stake races, and piloted Chillicothe in four winning races in six starts. Dayspring had an unbeaten record until her last start when she lost at five-eighths heat race at Youngstown. Both horses were unmarked until this spring, all their previous racing having been on the ice tracks. Ray has gathered about him quite a collection of good pacers and trotters, and is looking forward to a big season on the ice.

Cheerful Charlie broke the seasons trotting mark for the half mile at New Bedford track last week, going the distance in 1:06.

According to the word that comes from Dover, N. H., the pacers Earl Jr., 2015, and the Savoy 2024, have been matched to race at that place on Oct. 14th. The match developed into a discussion of the merits of the two horses, their race at Woonsocket being taken as the basis of comparison. Over the Rhode Island twice-around, The Savoy stepped a fourth heat in 2:10 1/4, while Earle Jr., was barely beaten in 2:10. The Savoy is owned by Barton A. Pardee of Atlantic City, N. J., and Earl Jr., by Arthur G. Jones and John W. Coakley of Brookline. The last names will drive the white pacer and Walter Cox will drive the Savoy. The race will be over the mile heats, best three in five.

THE BIG WINNERS.

The racing season of 1916 just closed has been one of the best the sport has ever enjoyed, and all in all, it can very properly be rated as the very best. In the way of speed it has provided a trotter to take nearly three seconds off the stallion records and a new two-year-old trotting champion as outstanding performances, with many other sterling feats that rank high.

The year has given us the most remarkable campaigning trotter of all time, Mabel Trask, whose battles with St. Francis have resulted in the best racing week in any week out ever seen on the Grand Circuit in the feature purse money event. As has been the case in several past seasons, Thomas Murphy heads the list of winning drivers, while Walter Cox is a closer competitor than the former has had in past years. Murphy's total this year is \$1,230 less than he won on the Grand Circuit last year with the world's one season biggest money winner, Peter Scott, in his string, while this year he drove the fourth, fifth, seventh and ninth biggest winning trotters and the second best winning pacer. As a winning driver Cox made a record for himself this season with a total of \$73,339 in his credit. This we believe to be the largest amount the New England driver has ever won in one season. This year he won \$30,605 more than last year, his total winnings in 1915 being \$42,734. Following is a list of leading winners in the Grand Circuit of 1916.

PARTICULARS RE DEATH OF PTE. JOHN ALWARD

Mr. John Alward of this city has received the following particulars from Rev. Pius McDonald, Chaplain of the 105th Battalion of the accidental death of his son at Shorncliffe: Mr. John Alward, St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, P. E. I. Dear Mr. Alward:— Before now you have been informed by telegram of the sad death of your son John, who was killed at Shorncliffe Station, on Thursday the 12th, inst., at 12:33 p. m., or 8:33 a. m., Charlottetown time. John with two other men were detailed to do some work on the South side of the railway track. At 11 a. m., they suspended operations to have dinner, after which your son crossed the line in order to speak to some comrades who were working on a job two hundred yards up the line, but at this time they were having luncheon down town. After a short stay he proceeded to rejoin his companions, and when crossing the line was struck by the Elham Valley train. No one saw him on the track before he was struck. The driver who was looking out on the South side of the train saw him as he fell to the ground. The general supposition is that as the unfortunate fellow stepped out on the track from between some trucks, his attention was attracted by a shunting engine on his left, and rushing across to avoid the only danger he thought was near, was caught

by the train coming in from the right, which would not easily be heard for it had already closed off its steam some little distance from the station and a strong wind was blowing against it. Our Battalion received word by phone, and I lost no time getting to him. His left arm was fractured half way between the elbow and the shoulder. He did not live long after receiving the shock. An inquest was held; the finding was "accidentally killed." Saturday evening at 5 o'clock his body was laid to rest in that part of the Garrison Cemetery reserved for the burial of Catholics. As the salute was fired, and the last post sounded over the first Islander of 1916, now consigned to mother earth in a foreign land, we naturally asked ourselves the question: How many more of us would meet a similar fate before this cruel war would close? It is a consoling thought to know that those in whom we are interested were found at their post of duty at that terrible moment, when time ceased and eternity began for them. And the man who has volunteered his services for King and country, who through no fault of his own never reaches the battlefield as a deserter of our country's admiration and gratitude as if he had died in the very front line fighting the enemy. The Battalion is erecting a tombstone to his memory, and yesterday the boys had twelve masses offered for the repose of his soul. The sympathy of the whole Battalion goes out to you and your family in this your hour of trial and grief. I feel it will be a source of consolation to you to know that he was so braver and that he had not the slightest mark against his conduct.
