

BLAIR DEFINES HIS POSITION

Declares he Does not Direct Telegraph's Policy

Has not Changed his Views—Why he Remained Silent—Agrees with Late Colleagues Except on their Railway Policy.

NOT ACCOUNTABLE FOR THE PRESS.

OTTAWA Sept. 26—(Special)—Hon. A. G. Blair in an interview declines to be held accountable for the Telegraph's change and does not direct its policy.

Mr. Blair asks to be judged only by what he himself says and does and says:

HAS NOT CHANGED VIEWS.

Mr. Blair says "Regarding the Grand Trunk, I have not changed my views since I stated them in Parliament.

WHY HE REMAINED SILENT.

It is true that since my speech in the House of Commons I have taken no part in the discussion of details, and I had my reasons for not participating in this controversial debate.

"I chose to rest the case in defence of my resignation from the ministry upon what I then said.

IN GENERAL ACCORD WITH HIS PARTY.

"I did not propose to enter upon an unpleasant series of controversies with my former colleagues, nor accentuate the disagreement between us, especially as on all other questions I am in accord with them."

At the Soo and an Outbreak is Feared.

George Crosskill Dead—Two Telegraph Directors Retire—An Engine Driver Jumps to His Death.

DEATH OF GEORGE CROSSKILL. HALIFAX, Sept. 26th, — (Special)—George Crosskill, one of the best known citizens and a famous cordial maker died today. He had been ill for some time.

The deceased was an uncle of W. H. Crosskill, official Stenographer and Librarian of the Legislature, Charlottetown.
