## Budge Defeats Fred Perry As Upsets Feature Los Angeles Tennis Tourney

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 27—(AP)—Donald Budge defeated his famous rival Fred Perry of England, today 3-2, 4-6, 6-2, 6-3, to win the men's singles championship of the 10th annual Pacific Southwest tournament.

In another upset Alice Marble of Los Angeles, United States women's singles champion, went down to defeat before the powerful stroking of slender Gracyn Wheeler of Santa Monica, sixth ranking woman player in the country, 7-5, 2-6, 6-4, in the finals of the women's event.

Four thousand net enthusiasts packed the Los Angeles tennis club galleries to see Perry the world's amateur singles champion, go down before the scintillating attack of the California redhead. Budge won the Pacific Southwest singles title last year. Perry took the title in 1932, 1933 and 1934. Budge's victory served in a minor measure to atone for his defeat by Perry twice before in tournament play this year, first at Wimbledon and then in the finals of the United States matches early this month. The Englishman, his game fading in the fourth set, virtually presented the last two games to Budge. Budge found a weakness in Perry's backhand in the first set and breaking through the Briton's service three times jumped into a lead after dropping the second and third games. Perry, warming up, broke the American's service to go 4-3, repeated it to make it 5-4, and captured the second set with an impressive rally 6-4. Decisions by Line Judges irked both players and the gallery as well in the vital third set. With the count 4-2 for Budge, Perry lobbed the ball across the net to give Budge, the game after one counter-decision, nor did Perry offer much

opposition in the final game of the set. In the semi-finals Saturday, the Red-head downed Jack Tidball, Los Angeles, 6-2, 6-1, 6-2, and Perry defeated Frank Shields, Hollywood, 6-3, 6-3, 8-6.

## World Series Fever Grips New York

NEW YORK, Sept. 27—(AP)—The advance guard of the 1936 world's series through rolled into New York tonight and the big town primed itself for the most hectic week in years.

Hotels began to fill. Broadway and the side streets in the 40's and 50's took on a holiday atmosphere. The visitors besieged ticket offices for pastboards to the Giant-Yankee classic starting at 2.30 p.m. A.S.T. at the Polo Grounds. There was plenty of scalping but few protests from the out-of-towners. They wanted world's series tickets and meant to have them. Jack Doyle, veteran Broadway bookmaker who has installed the American leaguers as 11 to 20 favorites, predicted more than \$1,000,000 will change hands in bets. Odds fluctuated all over town but everywhere the Yankees, who made a run-away race in the American League, were outstanding favorites to win six games. Eddie Brannick, secretary of the Giants, reported a sell-out of box and reserved seats for all three games scheduled at the Polo Grounds. After two games at the Polo Grounds, the teams will cross the Harlem River for three jousts at the Yankee stadium. If sixth and seventh games are necessary they'll go back to the polo grounds. Lean Carl Hubbell, the Oklahoma southpaw who just about single-handedly gave the Giants the pennant with 26 victories, 16 of them in a row, has been picked to face the big bertha of Lou Gehrig, Bill Dickey, Joe Dimaggio and company in the opening tilt. Just who will oppose Carl was uncertain although Big Charley Ruffing, Yankee right-hander and the only Yank sharpshooter to deliver 20 wins this season, seemed to have the inside track.

Change In Date For Boxing Tournament  
Joey MacDonald, local boxing promoter, last evening announced the postponement of the heavy-weight and light-heavyweight tournament until Monday evening October 12th. The bouts were originally scheduled for October 1st and 2nd. The change in date, Joey said, "was to allow time for the entries to get into better shape." He coupled this announcement with the statement that Benny Binns and Leo Kelly will not take part in the light-heavy tournament. The winner of the heavyweight tournament will meet Jim Evans, present holder of the Island heavy-weight crown, in a title bout. The light-heavy clash will be to determine a champion of that class. Valuable cash awards to runners-up in the tournament are offered. All entries must be Island boys and their weights must be for the heavyweight class from 175 lbs. up; for the light-heavy class 160 lbs. to 175 lbs. Entries may be sent to Joey MacDonald, the Patriot or Guardian offices.

## Springhill Fencebusters Even Maritime Series With 4-1 Win Over St. Croix Club

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. STEPHEN, N. B., Sept. 27—A two-base error with the bases loaded and a balk which put runners in position to score later contributed chiefly to the downfall of the St. Croix club of St. Stephen here yesterday against Springhill Fencebusters, 4-1. The Nova Scotian victory deadlocked the senior amateur baseball finals for Maritime supremacy, the series now standing at a win apiece. The teams will continue their play-off on the Springhill diamond Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon, with likely pitching selections Cecil Brownell and Purney Fuller, the two lefthanders who fought it out in the opening game here. Brownell took that game 2-0 but in the second tussle the mound honors went to elongated Thomas (Mountain Boy) Linkletter whose deceptive change of pace had the St. Croix batters helpless with men on bases.

LAST DITCH RALLY  
The winners of Saturday's game, which was a replay of the abbreviated contest curtailed at five and a half innings Thursday by rain with the Saints leading 1-0, staged a last ditch rally to beat the home club Two runs in the eighth and another pair in the ninth verse turned the trick. A sudden meltdown by Ken Kallenberg gave the Nova Scotia Champions their first real break in the eighth after the big righthander had held the Busters scoreless on three safeties for seven innings. The winners were quick to seize their opportunity as Kallenberg made a wrong move on a sacrifice bunt by Crawford, inserted between two singles. His throw to second base, too late to catch Fraser put Crawford also on base and Condy promptly dumped a single into left to crowd the cushions. Pete Talbot let Linkletter's grounder along the foul line go through him and Fraser and Crawford romped home with the tying and winning run.

ADVANCE ON BALK  
Next inning, Kallenberg added further to his own loss when he halted in his delivery preliminaries on the rubber while Dykens and McDonald were on second and first. In addition, it was lack of control that put Dykens on base, Kallenberg having hit him with a pitch. The balk sent the runners along a base each and Fraser shot a high fly to Coffey in centre, too deep to prevent Dykens bringing in the third Springhill tally after the catch. When Crawford followed with a single which he had to outfield to first on McCarroll's throw, McDonald scored the final marker from third. He also had moved up after the play by Coffey who threw to Kallenberg. After granting the losers two hits on which they fashioned their lone run in the fourth frame, Linkletter was master the rest of the way. A passed ball by Crawford also contributed to the St. Stephen score, letting Coffey reach third, to score a minute later when Harry Boles sent a looping single to short centre. Coffey smashed a one-bagger to the second base side of shortstop Fraser to open the inning, Fraser making a sensational stop of the daisy cutter but being unable to try for the fleet-foot centre fielder of the home team. Talbot's infield out advanced Coffey to second.

FEATURE PLAY  
Four smart double plays, two for each team, were feature plays of the game and offset together with several other twinkling defence displays, the several lapses. While both teams accounted for seven hits, the Saint had the edge in fielding. They had just one error to four by the winners, but that one was the turning point in the battle of righthanded speed ball hurlers. On the other hand, the local team, now striving for their fifth Maritime crown in six seasons, and noted for ability to capitalize on opponents' mistakes, were unable to do so yesterday. All four misuses by Springhill went for naught, Linkletter boring down to nip the threats.
