MR. HERBERT MCKENZIE

The sudden and unexpected death of Mr. Herbert McKenzie, mail clerk on the Charlottetown-Toronto train, came as a surprise to his many friends and relatives.

Mr. McKenzie left Charlottetown Thursday morning and made his usual run as usual, but at night took suddenly ill from acute indigestion and passed away at his home there.

Mr. McKenzie was thirty-nine years of age and was a native of St. John's River. He has been twenty years in the postal service, was a most popular and efficient official and a very kind and cheerful man.

He leaves to mourn a widow, Miss Kathleen Comiskey, daughter of Hon. J. H. Comiskey, ex-M.P. He also leaves a son, John, who is a student at St. Dunstan's college.

He was a valued member of the Knights of Columbus and Messrs. Charles McNeil and N. McNeil, Summerside, that order, accompanied the body to Charlottetown.

The members of the Charlottetown Chapter of the Knights of Columbus met the train upon its arrival at 5:20 o'clock, and a procession was formed accompanying the remains to Hennessey's Undertaking Rooms.
