ANCIENT ABOIDEAUX PROVE VALUE RECLAIMING LAND

When the Acadians left France and settled in what are now the Maritime Provinces of Canada they left behind a unique method of reclaiming marsh land from the tidal rivers, the aboideaux which is a sort of box culvert with a hinged wooden flap or valve that allows the water to drain off but which a rising tide closes. These were located at convenient places in the dykes which they built to hold back the tidal waters at flood tide. Down in Nova Scotia, in the vicinity of Greenswich, three hundred yards of new dyke walls have been completed with an aboideaux. This dyke-land, valued at one hundred dollars an acre, was reclaimed almost three centuries ago by the early Acadians. When the section of what is now the Canadian National Railway was built in the vicinity of Aulac, in New Brunswick, at the border between the two provinces, use was made of one of these early aboideaux to cross a tidal stream and it is still in existence carrying the line of railway which comprises part of the main line between Montreal and Halifax over which flows much of Canada's wartime traffic.

SEAMAN HERO BACK ON JOB

LONDON, Nov. 1—(CP)—A British seadog from away back, "Ginger" Milton is back again. He was out for three years recovering from the effects of a Nazi dive bomb attack on his small motor-coaster. Direct hits smashed the holds and killed or wounded the crew. Milton beached the ship and rescuers found him covered in blood and cement, cursing the Nazis. His feat in saving his ship won him the M. B. E. but it retired him from the sea for three years. Now, past 60, one of Britain's best known coastal skippers, he is back again aboard a new coaster.

A. T. S. GIRLS COLLECT SPIDER

LONDON, Nov. 1—(CP)—There is no place for squeamish girls in the spider web collecting department of the Auxiliary Territorial Services. A. T. S. girls collect the webs, store them and use them for repairing sights of binoculars and other precision sighting instruments. BRITISH PRISONERS ARE TREATED BETTER

LONDON, Oct. 31—(CP)—Magnanimous treatment of some British prisoners of war in Germany led to an unofficial statement here that Nazi authorities are looking ahead to their ultimate defeat and wish to create a favorable impression.
According to a letter home from Trooper John Hazel, groups of prisoners have been taken on tours of "hotels of interest, have enjoyed first class food and even beer. The treatment is not isolated to any one camp. Hazel is a prisoner at Stalag VIII.
Detailed reports of such treatment however, there has been no official indication that shackles have been removed from Canadian and other prisoners taken at Dieppe.
