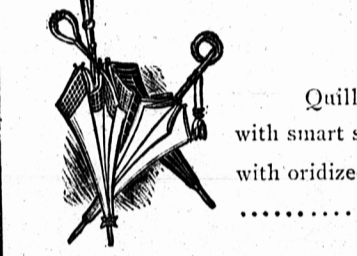

CITY GUARDS PUPILS' LIVES
 \$60,000 To Be Expended At Once On Fire Escape

BOSTON, March 29—The lives of all children attending all the Boston public schools are to be safeguarded at what ever cost, and work is at once to be done to this end as a result of a conference yesterday between the mayor, the school committee and the school house commission. It is estimated that the work will cost at least \$60,000 and the mayor has instructed the commission to expend such sum as may be necessary, taking it from the repair fund, and that he will see that they are granted an appropriation sufficient to cover the disbursements.

GERMANS HAVE AIRSHIP STATION
 Are Following the Leda The French in Airship Work.

BERLIN, March 30—The German military authorities have decided to establish a station for military airships at Metz, in South Germany, a distance of not quite ten miles from the French frontier.
