Local Rink Continues To Advance In Quebec Bonspiel Competition

QUEBEC, Jan. 25 (CP) — Heavy favorites for major honors in Quebec's 37th International Bonspiel, Armand McP. Limerick of Fredericton and Dr. G. M. Beall of Birch Hills, Sask., tonight were showing the way following quarter-final victories in the Chateau International and Val d'Or Golden Valley competition.

The Maritime and Prairie rinks are heavy favorites to clash in the Chateau International final. Today each won a single-point victory — Limerick's four-beating W. F. Goforth, Toronto Granite, and Dr. Beall's squad whipping J. Irving Hebb, Bridgewater, N.S.

Other semi-finalists are Adjuar Dussault and M. M. Stonehouse, both of Quebec.

Early tonight, prior to a dinner at which provincial Premier Duplessis was expected to attend the grand curlers' banquet, first round play for the Lieutenant-Governor's Award was scheduled to start.

The Lieutenant - Governor's competition is open only to quarter-finalists of the Chateau International and the Val d'Or sections. Also eligible are the quarter-finalists in the Grand Aggregate, opened to rinks which lost their first round games in the Chateau International and the Val d'Or.

Rinks competing for the Lieutenant - Governor's Award also continue in three other competitions until elimination by defeat. Meanwhile, in the Holt-Remfrew International competition, M. D. Earle, of Saint John, Thistle, N. B., E. H. Nicholson and T. M. McCullough advanced to the third round. The two Midland rinks meet tomorrow in the quarter-finals of this event.
