Lacoste Captures Final U. S. Match

Downs Borotra and Assumes For Six Years Crown Worn by Tilden.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 20.—Four minutes under the hour was sufficient for Rene Lacoste of France to capture the final match of the United States tennis championship on the courts of the West Side Tennis Club yesterday when he downed his compatriot Jean Borotra, 6-4, 6-0, 6-4, and assumed the crown which for six years had been worn by William Tilden. This is the second time in the 45 years' history of the national championship that the title has gone to a foreigner, the previous trans-Atlantic victor being Hugh L. Doherty, of England, who secured the crown as far back as 1903. Tilden had worn the laurels continuously since 1920.

Ten thousand tennis enthusiasts thronged the Forest Hills stadium.

Flowers To Fight McTigue In Mexico

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 20.—Tiger Flowers, middleweight champion, will meet Mike McTigue in a fifteen-round non-championship bout at Tia Juana, Mexico, October 15. It was announced Saturday by Flowers' manager.
