On Thursday, October 8th, the Most Reverend Archbishop MacKenzie made a visitation to his clergy and lay officials on P.E.I. A number of meetings were held at Summerside and were largely attended. At 8:45 a.m. the Archbishop celebrated the Eucharist in St. Mary's Church, the clergy making a corporate communion.

During the morning and afternoon His Grace held consultations with the clergy regarding their work. The daily offices were said at their proper times. In the evening the laity met with the Archbishop the clergy being present also. Many important matters relating to the life and work of the Church were discussed. Special stress was laid upon the necessity for every member fulfilling his duties at the present critical time. Christianity must not only be preserved, but deepened and extended, if the victory of democracy is to be a real victory and the peace worth while.

A large number of the Laity from practically every Anglican parish on the Island was present. Included among the clergy were: Canon E. M. Malone, Rev. A. LeDrew Gardner of Charlottetown; Rev. L. Rev. A. C. French, Padre de the R. F. Station; Rev. G. R. Hartman, Crapaud; Rev. H. F. Newman, Kensington; Rev. F. D. Henderson, Port Hill; Rev. S. J. Davies, Alberton; and Archdeacon Harrison, Summerside. A dinner for the return to Charlottetown was given at the rectory by Archdeacon and Mrs. Harrison and supper for the Laity and Clergy was provided by the ladies of St. Mary's Parish in the parish hall at six p.m.
