YESTERDAY a report was current that a man named Frank Malone, of Bonwell who came to the city on Friday last, has not been heard of since. It is stated that he was accompanied by a man named McQuaid of North River. It is also alleged the man who is missing had money on his person. It is thought, however, by some that Malone has left the Province.

THE S. S. Minto arrived at Georgetown at 10 o'clock a. m. with the following freight: 2 cars flour 2 cars way freight. There were 90 bags mail and 19 passengers including, Mrs. Arch. McKenna, of Pictou; Mr. Thompson, of Halifax; Jas. P. English, Pictou; Chas. McDonald, Lower Montague; Jas. S. Chambers, Wallace, and Capt. Wm. Batt of Charlottetown.

THE work of opening up the P. E. Island railroad in the western section of the Province is being prosecuted with vigor. The train which left the city yesterday morning went as far as O'Leary and returned to the city last night arriving at 10 p. m. The track is not yet clear between Bloomfield and Tignish. Cape Traverse branch is also blocked. All other trains are running on time. Yesterday evening a plow and engine went off the track on the Cape Traverse branch about half a mile west of Emerald, caused by ice on the rail under three feet of snow. The storm of Monday night left the track in the worst condition that it has been for a number of years and in some places the pick has to be resorted to in order to effect a clearance. Everything possible is being done to clear the branch with safety and speed.

Y. M. C. A. HALL was well filled last night with an attentive audience to hear the cantata, "The Pillar of Fire", given by Zion Church choir under the able leadership of Prof. Stanley. The program, though somewhat long, was well rendered the several performers sustaining their parts admirably, showing careful and painstaking training on the part of their leader. The Cantata reflects great credit on performers and conductor, while not a very strong, it is certainly a very sweet chorus, the parts evenly balanced and due attention paid to expression and attack. The work is not a pretentious one musically, relying for its charm on sweet harmonies and simple, flowing melodies. The soloists in their individual as in their concerted numbers did excellently. The chorus made their work effective by a praiseworthy attention to nuance. A small orchestra led by Professor Grant contributed their share to the pleasure experienced by all present.

MR. EWEN MCMILLAN'S PAPER.

Mr. Ewen McMillan of New Haven, a graduate of the Guelph Agricultural College then read the following paper:

Our past successes in dairying have been achieved mainly by the adoption of improved methods in feeding our cows. The influence of selection and breeding which is also great, does not manifest itself so quickly, and although a considerable improvement may justly be attributed to this source, the feeding problem must always prove to be a live topic with the dairy farmer since feed affects the returns from scrub and purebred alike.

The typical dairy cow is well adapted to consume a large quantity of the coarse fodder which can be produced cheaply on the farm, and it is expedient, therefore, that the ration should be bulky in order to conduce to the greatest economy and also to meet the requirements of the animal. Further, as the cow while giving milk is employed at hard work, the ration should be rich in digestible nutrients.

The demands made upon the food by the animal's body have to be met, and in addition the necessary constituents must be supplied to furnish the milk. It has been estimated that sixty per cent of the food consumed by the cow is required to sustain life, the remaining forty per cent being available for production. If the cow is forced entirely to depend upon a coarse and difficultly digestible ration too much bulk will be required to furnish the necessary nourishment, the labor of digestion will be great, and the per centage required to sustain the vital activities will be increased. In summer, however, when fresh forage is abundant a large quantity may be fed with no injurious effects. At other times a part of the ration should be in concentrated form to obtain the greatest economy in feeding.

Again, the ration should be properly balanced, i. e., the nutrients which it contains should be in proportion to the wants of the animal. The dairy cow requires a large amount of protein in her food.

Average milk contains 3.6 per cent of nitrogenous substances, and a cow giving twenty five to thirty pounds of milk daily yields about one pound of protein
