World Tour In 92 Foot Schooner (Canadian Press) GLOUCESTER, Mass., Nov 6—Answering the call of adventure in far away places, a little amateur crew with Dorothy Brandon of Toronto among them, set sail today in a 92-foot schooner on a voyage intended to carry them around the world. The crew is composed of men and women, with the exception of Miss Brandon all Americans, from widely scattered points. The schooner is The Yankee, owned by Captain Irving Johnson of Spring-

field, Mass., 28-year-old head of the expedition. The vessel is a Dutch-built, formerly North Sea pilot boat, two masted. In addition to her conventional schooner rig, she carries a square yard forward, formerly the royal yard of the German square rigger, Bremen. This is a 36-horsepower auxiliary motor for harbor waters. The crew includes Captain and Mrs. Johnson, Mate Frederick Jackson, of Providence, R. I., second mate Douglas Hancock of Swarthmore Pa. The party expected to reach Panama in about two weeks and to sail thence through the canal into the Pacific Ocean visiting the

Galapagos Islands, Eastern and Pitcairn Islands in the South Seas. The party plans to spend six months among the Atolls and islands of the South Seas, visiting little-known places, before pressing on to the East Indies.
