SPENDING MUCH.

The supplementary estimates brought down the other day by Hon. Mr. Fielding were somewhat in excess of the total expenditure of the Dominion in 1897-8. In the first five years of our federal history, with a population of three and a half millions the expenditure was year by year from thirteen to eighteen millions. Now, with a population of six millions, we are spending over eighty millions of dollars a year. We have a somewhat vivid remembrance of years spent in Liberal journalism, and in opposition, when all the excellent Liberal journals made it the burden of their daily story that the Government of the day was spending too much money. The same excellent journals now cheerfully accept an expenditure three or four times as great.

The plain fact is that the Dominion is spending money at a rate that would have been thought ruinous thirty years ago, and yet the Dominion is not ruined. On the contrary it has many of the outward and visible signs of prosperity. We are raising more products from the soil—not in the older Provinces, perhaps, but

as a nation; we are manufacturing vastly more, buying and selling much more abroad, producing more from our mineral resources, increasing our means of transportation, and building up great cities. Even Sir Richard Cartwright, champion economist as he was in the seventies of last century, who kept the expenditure rigidly down to a dead level when he was Finance Minister, has become a convert to the new doctrine of spending freely.

Now our object is neither to condemn nor excuse the new policy of lavish outlay to which the once economical Liberal party with its press exponents has become so thoroughly converted and is practicing with all the zeal of a new convert. We simply express our doubts as to its wisdom and record the facts as they exist. The dear people want the money spent and the Government spend it accordingly. Laurier would probably have been long ago dismissed from power if he had adopted and persisted in the rigid economy of honest Alexander Mackenzie's day. On the other hand when in all our history was ever a Government turned out of office for spending too much? "Like Government, like people." The people have their way. Let posterity take care of itself, and anyway, what has ever posterity done for us? "While we live let us live," is the motto of our present statecraft.

Of course, it would be awkward for the Liberal editors were they condemned for an hour or two each day to read their old files. This they are not compelled to do. And after all, we are doing better than Russia, which is spending in one month of a disastrous war what the Dominion spends in a year within her own borders in more or less useful public works and services. One day of battle in the Korean straits cost Russia something like the price of our new Trans continental Railway. Humiliation, loss of prestige and fearful loss of life went with the destruction of Russia's fleet. Nations recover from even such losses as that. We conclude therefore that even our lavish national outlay of these days will not necessarily bring ruin in its train. But we are already going at a rapid pace. Fifty years ago with a population about five times as great as ours the total expenditure of the United States was much less than that of Canada today.

One of the dead animals complained of as an offensive nuisance on the Brighton Beach has been removed and the other remained down to last night. We again call the attention of the Board of Health and the Mayor as its Chairman, to this matter. There can be no doubt as to the liability of somebody and the aggrieved residents must of necessity find a speedy remedy. It is shamefully discreditable that such offences against the public health and comfort can be committed and repeated in this manner and no apparent effort made to check them or bring the guilty parties to punishment.

Mr. Fielding has now been Finance Minister of Canada for over nine years. Mr. Foster, his immediate predecessor, held that position for eight years.

The United States had a deficit of \$24,000,000 in the year just closed. Up here in prosperous Canada surpluses are the rule: but our country is bigger. It is also cooler, and more orderly and we have a much smaller proportion of colored population. Uncle Sam has a good deal to contend with and we cheerfully make allowance.

Winnipeg according to a special census taken a short time ago has 78,367 inhabitants; That is exclusive of the quite populous suburbs of St. Boniface, Norwood and Louise Bridge, which would swell the total to about 96,000. At the census of 1901 the population of the prairie capital was 42,600. The city was never before being built up so rapidly as at the present time.

A notable exchange of courtesies is now going on between the fleets of Britain and France. The program opens with the British fleet visiting the harbor of Brest to be followed by a return visit of French warships to Portsmouth. The neighbor nations which were enemies in the centuries past, have not exchanged hostile shots since 1815, the year of Waterloo.

A new power producing plant of German invention is claimed to produce each horse power with the consumption of only one pound of coal per hour, instead of about eight pounds as heretofore. Montreal Herald takes note of a demonstration now being made in that city of this wonderful invention. The plant first extracts the energy from coal in the form of gas and applies this in a gas engine.

"A Shareholder" writing to The Patriot of last evening complains that The Guardian treats the Light and Power Company unfairly. The main point of "Shareholder's" objection seems to be that we said yesterday morning we could not think the Company "had any expectation that their proposal for a renewal of contract would be accepted." One reason for this statement is obvious enough to everybody but "Shareholder." We had before pointed out that while the city has power to buy the existing plant, or build a new one, it has no power, so far as we can see to renew the contract with the Company. Apart from this, on comparing the two offers made by the Company, one being to sell their plant outright and the other to make a new contract, we concluded, whether rightly or wrongly, that the Company desired rather to sell out. "Shareholder" displays a good deal of needless heat and takes a course much more calculated to raise prejudice against the Company than anything in The Guardian's articles on this subject.
