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## FASCIST FORCES CONVERGING ON MADRID

### HURRICANE THREATENS WIDESPREAD HAVOC

#### ROARS ALONG ATLANTIC SEABOARD

Four Ship Reported In Danger Zone. Storm Strike North Carolina.

Today (Friday) is the 10th anniversary of the tropical hurricane which swept in from the ocean across the east coast of Florida and into Alabama and Mississippi, Sept. 18, 1926.  
In that destructive blow 372 persons were killed, 6,281 were hurt, 17,884 families were temporarily made homeless and 1,000 homes were destroyed.  
The greatest damage was at Lauderdale, Hollywood, Dania and Hialeah, where the dead numbered 20.

#### FEAR HEAVY LOSS

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 17.—(A.P.)—The season's worst tropical hurricane roared toward the Cape Hatteras section of the North Carolina coast tonight carrying a threat of death and destruction.  
The United States Weather Bureau here warned those on land and sea to expect full hurricane winds of at least 75 miles an hour, unusually high tide and torrential rain.  
Governmental and private agencies aided citizens in eastern North Carolina and Virginia to prepare for the storm. Despite Weather Bureau warnings for several days, at least four ships were believed in the danger zone.  
Forecasters called the storm a severe one and said it probably would affect the Atlantic seaboard from Southport, N. C., to Atlantic City, N. J. They ordered hurricane signals up in the area from Wilmington to Manteo, N. C. and north-east storm warnings north and south of this section.  
The Hampton Roads Maritime Exchange said it feared four ships which had left Norfolk within the preceding 24 hours might be caught in the storm. It listed the vessels as:

The West Texas of the Southern Steamship Line bound for Houston, Texas.  
The Whipple of the Standard Fruit Company, bound for Cuba.  
The British ship Ashworth, bound for London.

#### Official Confirmation Of Dalvay And Vicinity In Park Recommendation

#### Report Of Ottawa Officials Recommending Dalvay And Adjoining Areas As National Park Site Awaits Government's Decision.

As previously reported in the Guardian, Dalvay has been favoured as a National Park site in the recommendation made to the Provincial Government by Messrs. P. H. H. Williamson and W. D. Cromarty of the National Parks Branch of the Department of the Interior, who made an inspection visit here early this summer. Included with Dalvay is the Cavendish area and adjoining areas embracing portions of New London Harbour, Rustico, Stanhope, and Tracadie.

In commending the Dalvay site the federal officials refer to the valuable acquisition of the buildings for hotel purposes. Substantial alterations, however, may be required. It is suggested that the Canadian National Railways, or some other organization properly financed and experienced in providing such accommodation, should lease the building as a summer hotel.

To gain access to the beaches it is recommended that an area be acquired extending on the south side of Mill Cove into which runs the Winter River. It is considered that the whole valley of this stream should be acquired. Inclusion of this area would bring the southern end of the Park practically to the Railway which runs from Charlottetown to the east end of the Island. The Eastern boundary of the Winter River section of the Park should be across the mouth of Mill Cove.

#### Blum Settles Strike But Political Unrest Grows

PARIS—Sept. 17 The Lille textile strike, largest of a widespread wave, was settled tonight after laborious negotiations in which Socialist Premier Leon Blum acted as peacemaker.  
The Lille agreement gave 35,000 workers a six per cent increase in wages and allowed employers authority over factory delegates named by workers to represent them in collective bargaining.  
But the new threat spread fear of possible political fighting between Rightists and Leftists.

#### REPAIR PLANE FOR LAST LAP OF OCEAN HOP

#### Richman and Merrill expected to Leave Musgrave Harbor for Harbor Grace Today.

MUSGRAVE HARBOR, Nfld., Sept. 17.—The \$100,000 monoplane Lady Peace was ready tonight to begin the last lap of its New York-London-and- return flight as soon as it could be removed from its landing swamp here to a nearby beach.  
A crew of mechanics brought here by Captain Eddie Rickenbacker from New York found the plane little damaged today from its forced landing here after carrying Harry Richman and Dick Merrill across the Atlantic from England.  
The two fliers had already freed its nose from the bog, and after a few adjustments, including the fitting of a new propeller, the mechanics had the plane's engine running perfectly.  
After the plane is taken to the beach, the only safe runway in the district, Richman and Merrill will take off for Harbor Grace and from there they will fly on to New York. The Lady Peace is scheduled to leave here at noon tomorrow.

Apparently the beach was considered a safe runway for the big monoplane. The motor vessel Lincoln 11 which brought Rickenbacker and his rescue crew here was sent back to Carbonear late today. It was planned to dismantle the Transatlantic plane and take it away from here in the Lincoln if the beach was unsuitable.

The rescue party will fly back to Harbor Grace in other planes tomorrow when Dick Merrill takes the Lady Peace into the air again.

#### Three Killed In Trinidad Blast

PORT OF SPAIN, —Trinidad, Sept. 17—Three persons were killed today in a terrific explosion at Trinidad Leaschold's refinery.

The force of the explosion, caused by excess pressure in a pipe, shook the whole plant. One man on the top floor of the building was shot several feet in the air and was killed instantly. The other two died in hospital from injuries.

The building caught fire following the explosion and threatened further damage. Fire apparatus, called to the scene immediately, was able to control the blaze, however, before it gained headway.

#### Four Killed As Bus Crashes Tree

CHESHIRE, Conn., Sept. 17—(A.P.)—A 30-passenger bus skidded on wet pavement near here tonight and crashed into a tree, killing four persons and injuring 15 others.  
The dead: John F. O'Donnell of Waterbury, operator of the vehicle; Miss Elizabeth Norton, 22, Cheshire; Miss Ingeborg Anderson, 30, Waterbury; Mrs. Doris Galor, 32, of Cheshire. None of those hurt was believed to be in a critical condition.

#### Dunning Leaves For Island Today

OTTAWA, Sept. 17—Only one judicial appointment, that of Herbert Shandley, K. C., Victoria, to the county court, was completed at today's session of cabinet council. Other bench vacancies, including that of the Chief Justice of Ontario, will go over until next week, Justice Minister Ernest Lapointe, acting prime minister, stated tonight.  
Two more ministers will be added to the number who are absenting themselves from Ottawa during the next week or two. Finance Minister Charles Dunning will leave, probably tomorrow, for Prince Edward Island, and Defence Minister Ian MacKenzie is on his way to Halifax where he will attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Infantry Association.

#### FLIERS UNDER MEDICAL CARE

FORT RELIANCE, N.W.T., Sept. 17 — Flight-Lieutenant Shelton Coleman and Aircraftman J. Forrey, lost a month in the Barren Lands, were under medical care at this Royal Canadian Air Force base tonight.  
Comrades who found them prepared to fly the airmen to hospital and recuperation in Edmonton. For 31 days Coleman and Forrey, who formerly were stationed in Nova Scotia, wandered over the wind-swept Barren Lands after being 'forced down after their gasoline supply gave out.  
It was planned to start the 900-mile flight southward to Edmonton tomorrow. Stops may be made along the way and their arrival in the Alberta capital is uncertain. They may reach there tomorrow night.

#### SAYS RECOVERY BECOMING WORLD WIDE

#### President in Optimistic Address At Annual Convention

ST. ANDREWS-BY-THE-SEA, N. B., Sept. 17—(C. P.) — Despite the unsettled international outlook, recovery is becoming world-wide, Arthur B. Wood, President and Managing Director, said today in his address to the annual convention of the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada.  
His opinion, he said, was based on reports from all parts of the world. In Great Britain, he pointed out, employment now was the highest in history.  
Comparative stability prevailed, the President asserted, in the exchange value of the currencies of leading trading nations. Price levels had become better adjusted.

Another vital indication of economic recovery cited by Mr. Wood was what he termed "the returning morale of our people, resulting from the improvement in general business conditions."  
Mr. Wood pointed to the noteworthy improvement during the first half of the present year in the durable goods industries. Building, machinery and iron and steel companies had reported earnings 100 per cent larger than for the corresponding period of 1935, and the combined earnings of more than 400 industrial corporations show a 52 per cent increase over last year.

The fact that the North American continent is still in a comparatively early stage of its development, he said, was a source of optimism.

#### Railway Director Is Island Native

MONTREAL, Sept. 17—(C.P.)—Colleagues presented a wrist watch tonight to Brenion L. Daly of Winnipeg, newly-named director of the Canadian National Railways to represent the Company Labor Unions.

Long a conductor on the western lines of the Canadian National, Mr. Daly is a native of Charlottetown. He is general chairman of the Order of Railroad Conductors, Western Region, Canadian National Railways.

The presentation was made by John Bell, General Chairman of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, Eastern Lines, Canadian Pacific Railway, in the presence of 80 railroaders.

Mr. Daly said he was deeply touched by the gift. He declared he would carry out his new duties to the best of his ability, feeling that the interests he represented were his own interests as well.

#### Labor Party May Modify Stand Re Re-armament

LONDON, Sept. 17—(C.P. Cable)—The question of Labor support for the Government's rearmament program loomed tonight as a contentious point for discussion at the party's annual conference at Edinburgh starting Oct. 5.  
In view of the situation in Europe, many Labor leaders think the time has come to modify their opposition to the program, which was voiced frequently throughout the last session of parliament.  
The national executive of the party is meeting tomorrow to consider the statement of policy which will be submitted to the annual conference.  
Ernest Bevin, leading trade unionist, already has said that the "Fascist menace" could no longer be met by mere resolutions and this is the opinion of a majority of the general opinion of the trades union council.  
If the proposal is given even modified support and carried by the conference a split of some consequence is foreseen in the Labor ranks.  
It is unlikely that any statement will be made after tomorrow's executive meeting.

#### Launch Drive To Relieve Besieged Alcazar Fortress

#### Fierce Battle Fought Near Toledo As Insurgents Open Triple Offensive.

MADRID, Sept. 17—General Francisco Franco, head of the Spanish insurgents, tonight led his Fascist legions, 175,000 strong, against the government-held cities of Toledo and Madrid.

A battle, which Government sources termed "the fiercest since the outbreak of the revolution," was fought near Toledo, 40 miles south of Madrid.  
The Fascists were driving toward 1,700 of their comrades threatened with being blown up in their besieged fortress the Alcazar at Toledo.

Government leaders who earlier had announced a "terrible decision" to blow up the fortress and all the men, women and children within, postponed action today to give the occupants one last chance to surrender their women and children. The men they said, were doomed.

#### Premier King And Party In France

CHERBOURG, France, Sept. 17—(C.P. Cable)—In radiant sunshine Prime Minister MacKenzie King with members of the Canadian delegation to next week's meeting of the League of Nations Assembly at Geneva arrived this afternoon at Cherbourg aboard the liner Empress of Britain.  
Hon. Philippe Roy, Canadian Minister to France, was present to give the delegation a greeting.  
Senator Raoul Dandurand, minister without portfolio, Minister of Labor Norman Rogers and Dr. O. D. Skelton, Under-secretary of State for External Affairs, travelled with Mr. King.

All the members of the delegation were in excellent form after an enjoyable sea journey.

#### Disension Reported

HENDAYE, France, Sept. 17—(A. P.)—Quarrels threatened unity of the Spanish Government's northern Army tonight, and Fascists awaited an open break to facilitate a new offensive.  
Anarchists and Basque Nationalists within the Government forces at Oriz, just west of San Sebastian, were at odds, reliable sources revealed. Each faction sought to impose its mandate upon the army.  
(The Nationalists broke with Anarchists in the surrender of San Sebastian last week, and prevented the latter from firing the city when they fled to Oriz before advancing Fascists.)

#### Condemn Yellow Journalism

ANTIGONISH, N. S., Sept. 17—(C.P.)—Prominence given by the daily newspapers to the horrible details of murder trials, divorces, scandals and all so-called sins of society" was protested today by a convention of the Catholic Women's League of Antigonish, N. S.  
In a resolution forwarded to every newspaper in Nova Scotia the convention went on record as "strongly disapproving the publicity of such filth."
