LEAGUE COUNCIL REJECTS REICH PROPOSAL

STATE OF ALARM DECLARED IN SPAIN

VIOLENCE FLARES A NEW IN DISORDERS

Mobs Storm Estates of President Niceto Alcala Zamora.

MADRID, March 16—The Spanish cabinet tonight agreed to declare a state of alarm for a period of one month throughout the entire country after a series of political disorders which extended even to the estate of President Niceto Alcala Zamora.

The President signed a decree providing for the revision of all proceedings whereby Jesuit property was to be returned to the Society of Jesus. All orders authorizing the property return were suspended for re-examination.

The attack on the President's properties was part of a series of incidents which swept across Spain as the new leftist parliament opened its first session.

BERLIN, March 16—The German Government took its case again before the people today in campaign mass meetings held throughout the Reich on the "day of the defence forces."

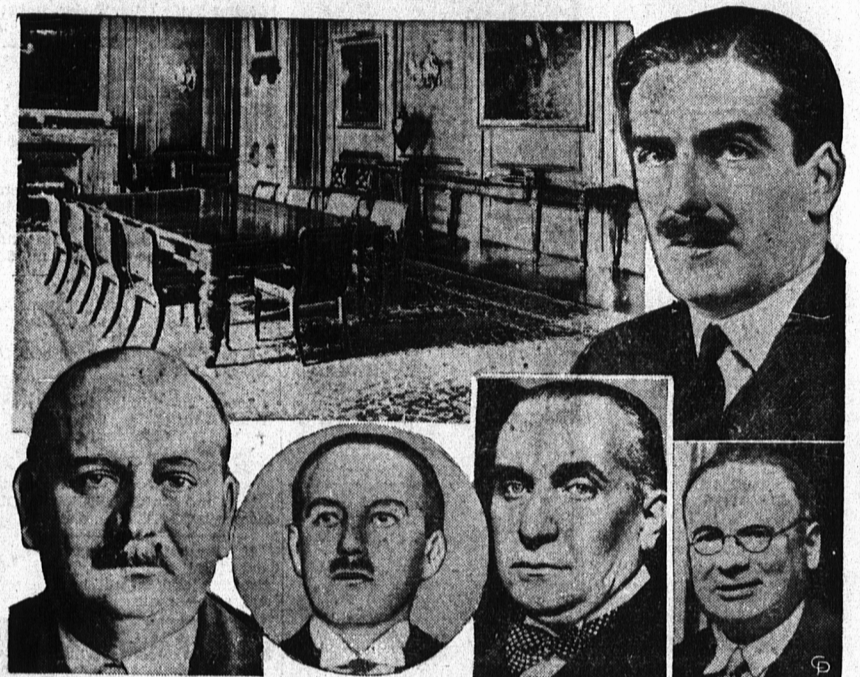
Will Observe "Peace Hour"

Council Claims No Authority To Rule On German Peace Proposal In Short Dramatic Meeting.

PROSECUTION DEMANDS CONDON

TRENTON, N. J., March 16—The battle to save Bruno Richard Hauptmann from execution two weeks hence and the imminent return of one of his chief accusers, Dr. John P. Condon, Lindbergh ransom intermediary, stirred the prosecution to action today.

Second Stay From Execution Sought For Hauptmann.

Attorney General David T. Wilentz, who headed the prosecution at Hauptmann's trial at Flemington, summoned prosecutor Anthony M. Hancok, Jr., of Hunterdon County, and Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, head of the state police, to his office in the state house.

Private and Secret Sessions

All afternoon, first in private and then in secret session, the Council considered its reply. It was 7:25 p. m. (3:25 p. m. A.S.T.) when the delegates filed slowly into the Queen Anne's drawing room in the old palace of St. James for a public sitting.
