Interest Of Tourists Centers On Royalty

LONDON, July 15.—What will be the 250,000 American visitors who are expected this year in England enjoy most?

This question was propounded by the Associated Press to a number of tourist agents and hotel men.

"Royalty and its trappings," was the unhesitating answer of many of the American and Englishmen who have to do with the tourist traffic.

King and queens and princes and palaces have greater fascination for Americans than for continental visitors. The latter, so the tourist agents say, have had greater experience of royalty and accept it as a matter of course.

Red Coated Guards

The changing of the red-coated guards before Buckingham Palace at 10 o'clock every morning always attracts many strangers and the changing of the guard at Whitehall every morning at 11 draws even a greater crowd.

London Tower, with its murderous history, Hampton Court and other palaces associated with the life of Henry VIII and his unhappy wives, have a special charm for American visitors. Even the men and women who are but slightly versed in English history know about Anne Boleyn, Catherine of Aragon and the other unhappy ladies who sat on the throne with him.

Museums, galleries and theatres which enable visitors to get back into the atmosphere of the Elizabethan era are most popular, especially with visitors coming to England for the first time. Shakespeare and Drake are so inseparably connected with the reign of Queen Elizabeth that they share the popularity of the virgin queen in the estimation of tourists.

The Old Vic, with its never-ending season of Shakespeare, and the Shakespearean Theatre at Stratford afford visitors an opportunity to see the plays of the Bard of Avon in the theatre in the heart of London are not offering Shakespeare.

Warwick Castle Attracts

Tallyho and old inns—in fact anything which reproduces the atmosphere of old England attracts a large and increasing number of American visitors. Warwick Castle, so the tourist agents say, comes near, perhaps, than any other to filling the eye of Americans in search of a real castle, with walls and moats and drawbridges and a banquet hall in which the Knights of the Round Table might be sitting.

There is a considerable Dickens cult among the American visitors, and many of them are eager to visit the home of Burtons and the haunts of Wordsworth and other poets in English Lake district. University folk generally want to visit Oxford and Cambridge.

But the majority of American visitors give most of their time to London and points within easy reach of the British capital.

Nova Scotian Victim Of Boston "Con" Men

BOSTON, Mass., July 15.—Of all the many sly schemes which are the stock in trade of the army of confidence men and women who make their living by separating gullible people from their rolls without resort to violence or gun play, one of the most successful is the coin matching game, as Lloyd Graham, a New York interior decorator can affirm after his expensive meeting with a couple of gentry in Boston the other day, while Graham was enroute home to spend his holidays with his parents near Truro, N. S. Graham lost \$150, but managed to have his confidence man arraigned in court. They were granted bail which they promptly defaulted and Graham was still out his roll.

This happened in Boston a week ago or more. Graham was at the wharf whence the steamer sails for Yarmouth, N. S. Having some hours to dispose of before sailing time he went for a walk. He was accosted by a stranger, he told the police, and asked for a match which he gave. The ensuing conversation was interrupted by another stranger just as the first man was telling Graham that he too was to sail on the Yarmouth boat, enroute to Halifax. The second stranger asked the way to the State House and as the two chance acquaintances were going that way, they offered to be his guide. They decided to match for the smokes. "The second stranger lost and while

he was in a store making the purchase, the first stranger, whose name was later declared by the police to be Cerrigan, a well known confidence man, suggested to Graham that they gamble with the third man by matching coins. His scheme was that Graham always show a head while he would always show a tail and, as the odd man wins, one or the other would always take the money. When the second stranger returned they matched accordingly. When the third man had lost considerably to Graham and Cerrigan he suddenly resolved to risk his roll, \$200, in an attempt to recoup.
