C. M. B. A.—It will interest many people in the province to hear that the action of the trustees of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association, in raising the association's rates in order to place it in a solvent condition, was sustained the other day by Mr. Justice Middleton, in a judgment issued at Osgoode Hall, Toronto. But the judgment finds that the trustees had no power to issue paid-up policies to members who declined to continue their payments. In an analysis of the situation, His Lordship said that the association like many others of a similar nature, had started out to do insurance business at inadequate rates, with the result that it had been placed in an insolvent condition.
