One of the results of the convention of Sunday School workers held in Charlottetown, some days ago is the increased interest taken by the different branches of Sunday School work.

WHAT IS IT FOR?

The better training of the Sunday School teachers. The training of young people to become Sunday School teachers.

WHERE IS IT LOCATED?

It may be in your home, or in connection with your Church or Sunday School.

WHAT IS THE COURSE OF STUDY?

A small text book costing thirty cents, prepared by Rev. J. L. Hurlbut, containing: twenty-two Bible lessons, and eighteen training lessons.

WHO IS THE TEACHER?

Your Pastor, Superintendent, or any qualified person in your district, who may be selected by the class.

IF I CANNOT GET A CLASS, WHAT?

Study by yourself and be both pupil and teacher.

ARE THERE ANY EXAMINATIONS?

Yes, in June of each year there will be a written examination, and if seventy per cent. of the questions are answered correctly a Provincial Diploma will be awarded.

Not later than the 1st of May the leader of the class will send to the Superintendent.

BOSTON LETTER

Dino Gives a Review of the Subjects

OF PUBLIC INTEREST

In and About Boston—Islanders Arc Talked With in the Hub.

BOSTON, MASS., Oct. 22, 1900.—Two weeks from to-day the votes will be cast and counted which decide who will fill the presidential chair of this great Republic for the four years beginning March 4, 1901.

The most exciting thing in this vicinity lately was the murder of one George Bailey, a farmer who lived on the road leading from Lynn to Salem. Bailey was reported missing and a few days later his body, minus head, arms and legs, was found in a kind of swamp hole near a floating bridge not far from his farm.

And speaking about murders there will probably be an interesting trial across the Charles river in Cambridge shortly. I will begin at the first and give you the main facts as briefly as possible.

Alvan Clark, famous the world over as a telescope maker, who lived in Cambridge, died a few years ago, leaving a prosperous telescope business, considerable estate and three daughters. The estate he left to be divided equally between the three.

21 Shoe Factories in Quebec to Close.

6,000 WORKINGMEN

Will be Deprived of a Living—Union is The Cause of The Trouble.

QUEBEC, Oct. 27.—(Special).—The Boot and Shoe Manufacturers' Association which includes the owners of 21 factories have decided to close their factories indefinitely, thus depriving some six thousand laborers of a means of livelihood.
