### Winter Dairying

To make his business profitable the dairyman must carry it on during the whole year. Milk and its produce have been as a rule dearer in winter than in summer. A large amount of capital is invested in cows, barns and cheese-factories and creamery buildings. It is a usual policy to permit so much capital to be unproductive during five or six months of the year. In the past it has been not only unproductive but a source of expense. Considerable labor on farms during the winter is absorbed into the unremunerated chores of the farm buildings, unless animals are kept yielding a product of increasing value. Cows must be fed during the winter. If a direct revenue can be obtained, the work can be done with more enjoyment, more of it will be undertaken, and more profitable methods will be applied. Other branches of farm management, such as the raising of your stock, the fattening of swine, and keeping of laying hens, will grow out of it. There are few more discouraging and joyless occupations than a tending on cows all winter, without any revenue from the work.

There are hundreds of men who are employed as cheese-makers during the summer months and who unwillingly are comparatively idle during the winter months. If the capacity and ability which they possess, can be applied to make butter during the winter months, so much will be gained.

When dairymen obtain a satisfactory revenue from cheese factories during the summer, and get hardly any income during the winter, they can make only very slow progress in bettering their circumstances. The patrons who send most milk to the cheese factories in summer, might also send relatively the largest quantity in winter. As a result of the immediate revenue from butter-making in winter cows get better care and better feeding. As a consequence, they give more milk the following summer. After winter dairying was begun at the first Government dairy stations, the President of the Mount Elgin Dairy Company, who had thirty cows and had milked them during the winter, stated that during the month of May of the following year he obtained twenty-five per cent more milk from his herd of cows than he had ever obtained in that month in any previous year. Doubtless that was mainly owing to the fact that the cows were kept in a fairly warm stable during the winter months and fed on succulent feed to induce a large flow of milk. Unless cows on the average are made to milk during ten months in the year, they are likely to become unprofitable as milkers. It will not do to let the cows become a leisurely class on holidays for five or six months of the year.

The by-products of dairying in the form of skim-milk and butter-milk are more valuable for the raising of stock, the feeding of swine and the growing of chickens, during the winter and very early spring months than they are during the summer. The dairymen have not been, and cannot be fully prosperous until they have a revenue coming in regularly during the whole year.

### A Very Serious Question

The reports of the official food analysts, as made public from time to time, form useful subjects for study. A great deal of attention is devoted to the examination of baking powders, and very properly so, for they are articles of general use, and so many of them being adulterated all possible information should be given to enable consumers to distinguish between the good and the bad, says an English paper.

A large number of these articles have been analyzed by the official analysts of the Inland Revenue Department, the samples being collected from dealers in all sections. The impurities found were principally alum and lime, both wholesome. Alum baking powders cannot legally be used in England, but they are largely made and sold in this country. A long list of these powders is given in the report named, and their use is condemned on account of the unhealthfulness. Alum baking powders may generally be known by the lower price at which they are sold. They cost but a trifle to make and they could be sold at a profit at ten cents a pound. The claim by a manufacturer that a powder is "cheaper" is generally a confession of its inferiority.

It is better to buy and use only those powders of highest reputation, which have been examined by the official authorities and reported pure.

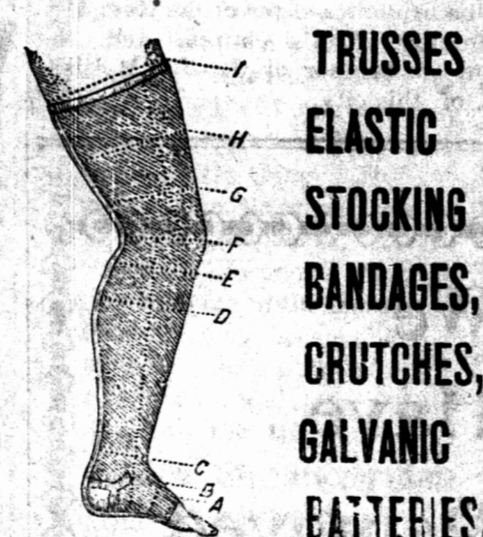

### THE PROHIBITION PLEBISCITE

#### Action of Grand Division, N. B. Sons of Temperance

At the last meeting of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance, N. B. has been taken the committee on the state of the order submitted a report, of which the following is the section in reference to the prohibition plebiscite. This section was adopted unanimously by the Grand Division:

Section 17—As the Grand Worthy Patriarch has said in his report, the long-alked-of and long expected plebiscite has come and gone, and in spite of the varying reports, that have been published in the newspapers there is no doubt that there is a substantial majority of the votes polled on the side of prohibition of the liquor traffic. As has been well said by the Grand Worthy Patriarch, "majorities rule in this country." On a bare majority of the electors voting a government is dismissed and another is placed in power; and the newly-elected government may make changes that will alter the whole fiscal policy of the country and affect every business in the country. It is therefore, idle to say that when every province of the Dominion with the exception of Quebec has given a majority for prohibition and the strength of these combined majorities is so great as to wipe out most thoroughly and effectually the largest adverse majority in Quebec—it is idle to say that the majority shall not rule. As a method of obtaining the opinion of the people in a British country, the plebiscite is somewhat of an innovation, whose place under our system of government requires very careful consideration. We live under a system of responsible government. According to this system the underlying principle is that the country must be governed in accord with the will of the people. The prohibition plebiscite has come to us in a perfectly legal way. Advising with the governor general a cabinet of ministers who command a majority in the House of Commons, elected by the people, introduced into that House a measure providing for a vote of the people on the advisability of the prohibition of the liquor traffic. The House of Commons and the Senate passed this measure and it received the consent of the governor general. Under this bill an election was held, and the majority of the voters declared in favor of the prohibition of the liquor traffic. Now, as this election was held under the measure to which the House of Commons, the governor general and his advisers, the premier and cabinet, consented, when the regular official returns are made up and submitted to these different branches of our government, a duty lies with each. In the first place it lies with the cabinet, who must be in accord with the will of the people as expressed by that people in the usual legal way to carry out the mandate given them by the electorate, and to initiate a prohibitory law, or, failing that, to resign their positions and to give place to men willing to do as the people direct. If they should fail to do either of these things, then we believe that it is the duty of the governor general, who by affixing his signature to the bill became a party to the measure, to dismiss his advisers and to secure others who are prepared to introduce a prohibitory law into the House of Commons, and if the House of Commons should fail to pass the prohibitory measure, to dissolve that House and to call upon the people to elect a new House of Commons to pass such a law. This, therefore, may bring us back to another election. Although not constitutional lawyers, to be in accord with common sense, your committee believe that this is the course that should be pursued. But we must wait. It takes some time for an expression of the will of the people by vote to be crystallized into a practical measure. We must, therefore, give the government of the day reasonable time. But at the same time we must let them understand distinctly what we expect of them. They must give to us a thorough prohibitory law, and they must attach to it the proper machinery for carrying it out.

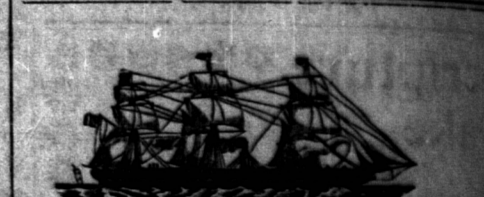
