## To the Farmers of Prince Edward Island

### IMPORTANT NOTICE

Owing to the scarcity of Swede Turnip Seed for the coming seeding season farmers are urgently advised to use the utmost care in sowing their Turnip Seed this year. When Swede Turnip Seed has been plentiful and the price low farmers have been in the habit of sowing two pounds and upwards per acre but this quantity can be reduced with good results and from one to one and one-half pounds is plenty of Seed to sow per acre; care being taken in setting the Drill so the Seed will not run out too fast and in this way the quantity of Seed available for the present seeding season will probably be enough and there will be no serious shortage but if the usual amount which has been sown in past years is continued this year there will be quite a shortage through no fault of the dealers, this year who had placed their orders early last year but as Seed comes from Great Britain the British authorities allowed only 50 per cent of the orders to be filled and shipped, although the dealers in that country had the Seed ready to ship but they were prevented from doing so by the government stating that the Seed would likely be required for home seeding.

We would suggest when sowing the Turnip Seed that all the holes in the canister be plugged with the exception of—say two holes close together; when each revolution of the canister the Seed would be dropped about the right distance and if one hole should miss letting the Seed through the second is liable to act. This would effect a large saving in the Seed, whereas if all or the greater part of the holes in the canister are left open a lot of the Seed is wasted as the plants are only hoed out. This of course applies to the ordinary Swede Turnip Seed, Drill and not the larger Horse Drills.

We trust this request coming from the Department of Agriculture as well as from the dealers will be carefully observed by the farmers; not only as there is a scarcity of Seed but the price is very high this year and if the farmer can save a dollar or two on his Turnip Seed order he is that much in pocket and will have just as good a crop of Turnips.

## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house or a quonset except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after entering homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation, free-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. ## THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917

RE. SMITH (Serial No. 791658 B. C.)

Inspector of Customs, granted temporary exemption to enable arrangements to be made to have his place filled.

March 15, 1918. This was an application for exemption on the ground of the importance in the National Interest that the applicant should continue his employment as an Inspector of Customs. The ground was also taken for exemption by reason of the domestic position of the applicant who married in September, 1917. It was also submitted that applicant's health was such as to unfit him for military service.

The Central Appeal Judge: The subject of this application is an Inspector of Customs. Before coming to the substance of the application it may be observed that a claim is made upon the ground of exceptional domestic position by reason of marriage in September, 1917 after the Military Service Act was passed, and another by reason of ill health.

As to the first; it has been observed more than once that he must be treated for the purpose of this application as being unmarried.

As to the second; an opportunity for further examination will be given if he desires it.

The substantial ground is the importance of his work as Inspector of Customs. In the circumstances disclosed, the General Appeal Judge thinks, that exemption should be granted for about two months, that is to say until the 1st of June, to enable satisfactory arrangements to be made.

Exemption till 1st June, 1918.

RE LEBLANC (Serial No. 970401 P. C.)

The chief correspondence clerk in the Naval Service Department at Ottawa, refused exemption beyond a short period to allow procuring of a substitute.

February 11, 1918. Applicant's claim for exemption in respect of himself on the grounds of domestic hardship, but it was strongly supported by the Deputy Minister of the Naval Service, on the ground that it was expedient in the national interest that the man should be continued in his habitual employment. It was submitted by the department that the position of Chief Correspondence Clerk, required high educational qualifications; that the applicant is a Master of Arts and possesses the qualifications necessary; that the correspondence of the department touched practically all departmental matters, including inventions submitted, inquiries of all natures, preparation of reports to Council, House of Parliament, correspondence, etc. It was also further submitted that the applicant had been engaged in this work for nearly four years and had acquired the special knowledge and experience necessary for its effective conduct, that it would greatly derange the organization

ion of the department if the man were removed.

The Local Exemption Tribunal allowed exemption until May 1, 1918, which ruling was confirmed by the Appeal Tribunal. In the present appeal it was submitted that the applicant should be exempted so long as he remains in his present position.

The Central Appeal Judge: This Appeal should be dismissed. The Central Appeal Judge cannot see any good reason for thinking that the period elapsing between the date when the Military Service Act was introduced, or for that matter the date when it passed the House of Commons, and the 1st of May, 1918 should not be sufficient for procuring a substitute for the subject of the application.

The Central Appeal Judge sees no reason to differ from the conclusion in which the Local Tribunal, including Judge Gunn, and Mr. Justice Sutherland who presided at the Appeal Tribunal, concurred, namely that exemption until the 1st of May ought to be sufficient.

Appeal dismissed.  
RE CLARENCE M. CHAPMAN (Serial No. 968064 M. C.)

The Secretary to the Chairman of the Railway Commission for Canada is not to be exempted by reason of his occupation. The fact that he proposes to farm his own land personally is no ground for his exemption.

January 29, 1918.

In this case the appellant is private secretary of the Chief Commissioner and Chairman of the Railway Commission of Canada. He appealed on his own behalf on the ground of the importance of his duties in the public interest. He also relied upon his importance in agriculture as a producer of food. On the latter point he established that he is the owner of 320 acres of land in Saskatchewan, which produced 7,400 bushels of wheat in 1916. He was preparing to have 240 acres sown with wheat in the coming spring, and proposed to take up agricultural work personally if exempted.

The Local Tribunal granted exemption till 31st of January, 1918, and the Appeal Tribunal refused to disturb it. He now appeals asking for total exemption.

The Central Appeal Judge: The appellant is Secretary to the Chairman of the Railway Commission. In 1908 he purchased 169 acres of land in Saskatchewan, and in 1912 he purchased the adjoining 160 acres. The property has been rented and the tenant has worked it on shares. The Local Tribunal granted him exemption until 31st of January, 1918. The Appeal Tribunal confirmed this decision. The appellant now says that he will go on the land himself and work it. He has not been engaged in practical farming for the last seven years, and there is no reason to think that production will be seriously affected by his absence on service.

The Chairman of the Railway Commission does not apply. The drafting of the applicant with no doubt for a cause of inconvenience to the Chairman of the Railway Commission, but no such detriment to the public service is suggested as would justify the granting of exemption.

Appeal Dismissed.

RE. G. L. MILLER (Serial No. 650584 F. C.)

A student of Civil Engineering and Forestry in the fourth year of his professional course in a university, is not to be exempted in order that he may complete his studies.

February 1, 1918. The appellant in this case had been refused exemption by the Appeal Tribunal, and had also been refused leave to appeal to the Central Appeal Judge. The matter now comes before the Central Appeal Judge on application for leave to appeal.

The Central Appeal Judge: The applicant is a student at the University of New Brunswick, taking a course of Civil Engineering and Forestry, and is in the fourth year. His claim is based upon the alleged national importance of the work in forestry, in which he desires to be engaged. Further, he advances the fact that he was married in the month of December last, and that owing to domestic reasons his continued presence at home is necessary.

Weighing the prospective value of the applicant's services, so far as one can estimate them at all, against the immediate and pressing necessity of providing men for the army, it is abundantly manifest that the facts stated do not afford any ground for exemption.
