TO PROTEST FREIGHT RATES.—Mr. A. Pomeroy left this morning for Moncton representing the Board of Trade and produce dealers of this city to protest against the further increase of express rates now being heard before the Board of Railway Commissioners.

DARING ROBBERY OF FOXES.—A daring robbery took place at Brudenelle, Kings County, when the ranch of the Imperial Fox Company of that place was broken into and fifteen valuable foxes were stolen therefrom. The Provincial Government is offering a reward of five hundred dollars for information which will lead to the conviction of the robbers.

GIRLS SMOKING.—One of the most repellant sights in a public place was that of Saturday evening in the Charlottetown Post Office where a couple of young girls and fifteen years old were smoking cigarettes and paying not the least attention to the scores of people passing in and out, until a member of the city council insisted on them throwing the cigarettes away, which they very reluctantly did. Smoking in the Post Office is contrary to the rules and seems all the more odious when young girls are the offenders. On all sides complaints are being received regarding the way hoodlums, both boys and girls are allowed to gather in the Post Office, sit on the radiators, smoke, use vile language, and insult people. It is time this thing was stopped.

TWILIGHT RECITAL.—The first of the series of twilight recitals organized in aid of the Protestant orphanage by the Ladies Aid of that institution, was held Saturday afternoon at the Methodist Church. There was a large attendance and a most enjoyable program was presented under the direction of Professor Fletcher who presided at the organ and gave a number of delightful selections, in which his splendid talent and the wonderful range of the magnificent pipe organ were well exemplified. Solos were given in excellent voice and expression by Mrs. J. J. Stewart and Mr. Pogson. The next of the series will be given in the Baptist Church next Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock, for which another choice program is being prepared. At each of the recitals a silver collection is being taken in aid of the Protestant orphanage, a purpose which, apart from the enjoyable and educative nature of the entertainment, should elicit the support and sympathy of all.

HUNGER STRIKERS IN CORK JAIL RESUME EATING.

DUBLIN, Nov. 12.—A statement issued tonight at Dublin Castle said the hunger strikers in Cork jail who had been without food since August 11 resumed taking nourishment at three o'clock this afternoon with an entire absence of unfavorable symptoms. The meaty statement added was administered under the direction of the medical officer of the jail, who believes that with careful treatment the prisoners ultimately will recover.

Teller Says He Robbed Ottawa Bank Himself

OTTAWA, Ill., Nov. 11.—Admission that he "engineered the whole thing himself," was made tonight according to county officials by Francis J. Carey, 29 years old, teller of the National City Bank of Ottawa, who gave himself up today following his disappearance yesterday at the time of the robbery of the bank. Most of the \$45,000 taken has been recovered, \$500 being added to night. Carey disappeared at first thought he had been locked in the vault.

Carey was found at the farm house of Mat Kerwin, near Utica, Ill., into which he staggered late today, footsore and weary.

He was brought back to Ottawa and made his reported confession. Carey denied the disappearance of \$4,000 of the loot. He had \$2 in his pocket.

Sheriff Ayers said that a shoe box containing \$40,000 which was the robbery, apparently had slipped from the young man's hand while he was going over the roof of the bank, on which he had climbed to enter the building. The \$400 recovered tonight was found under a mattress at Carey's house.

German Reparations Agreed Upon

PARIS, Nov. 13.—Definite agreement concerning the procedure to be followed with regard to reparations due by Germany was reached yesterday between the French and British Governments. The agreement calls for the meeting in Brussels called technical experts with the Germans and also a meeting of Allied Premiers in Geneva in the first half of February to discuss the total amount due and Germany's capacity for payment.

Son Charges Father With Murder

LANGDON, N. H., Nov. 13.—An abandoned well on the farm of Wm. B. Whitney, which had been filled with rock and debris, was re-opened today by County authorities in search for the body of Whitney's second wife. The search was ordered by County solicitor Henry N. Hurd, as the result of a declaration made to him by John Whitney, 15 years of age, a son of William B. Whitney, by a former marriage. He declared that he saw his father strike down his step-mother in their home four years ago and take the body to the hay mow and later bury it in the well.

No Increases For Longshoremen

ST. JOHN, Nov. 13.—There will be no increases granted to Longshoremen, or coal handlers here by the shipping companies at a meeting held yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade Rooms, the labor men were told conditions in the ship business were such that wage increases were impossible.

WAR WOULD COME BETWEEN DUTCH AND GERMANS

WARSAW, Nov. 14.—The declaration that war between Germany and Holland would be inevitable if the plebiscite to be held in Upper Silesia, gives the region to Germany is made in the Gazette Poranna in discussing the plebiscite. The newspaper is the organ of the National Democrats whose leader is John Domsaki. Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs. The Gazette Poranna predicts that another war would result with France and Belgium joining Poland and Great Britain siding with Germany.

The date of the plebiscite in Silesia has again been postponed indefinitely.

Meanwhile unrest in the region continues. The Polish miners, factory workers and rural laborers are dissatisfied with the German landlords and capitalists and constant friction is reported. A dispatch from Benthien today says that the Allied authorities seized a carload of German artillery, mine throwers, machine guns and ammunition.

The boy saved 5,000 marks in 3 months.
