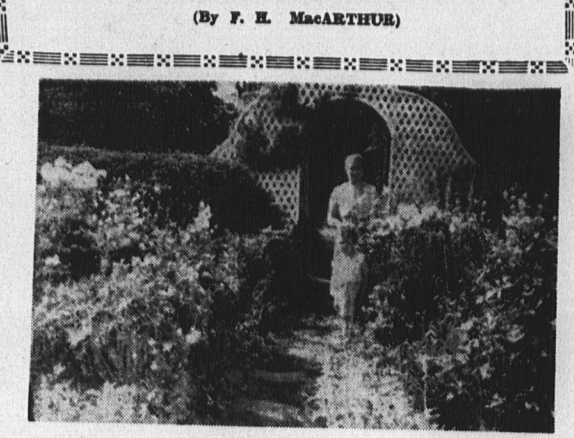

Beechwood Gardens

It was the evening of June fifteenth—still "chill" in this corner of the world—and shadowy fingers reached across the Garden of the Gulf as I stepped through the arched entrance that leads to one of the most magnificent outdoor gardens I ever have seen. A more picturesque site would be hard indeed to find. From the top of the highest terrace one gets a fine view of the West River, majestic and serene, forming as it were, a footstool for the Goddess of Beauty. To the north rises a crescent-shaped grove of beech trees, whose protecting branches and shady bowers shield this bit of Paradise from the excessive heat of summer as well as from early frosts and biting winds. It was this grove, too, that Mrs. Gordon MacMillan named her gardens. Beechwood Gardens are situated at North River, six and a half miles from Charlottetown, the capital city. Now in their twelfth year, they have progressed from a very humble plot into over three-fourths of an acre of perfect maturity. Upon entering this lovely Eden one immediately is captivated by its artistic arrangement and effect, the entire plot being laid out in square lawns, introduced by terraces, with steps leading from the upper to the lower garden, the two being divided by the MacMillan residence. The upper garden being a border of honeysuckle and so matured as its sister plot, I shall confine my article to the wonders I met with in the lower garden. Surrounding these beautiful products of nature is a native white spruce hedge about three and one-half feet high and nicely manicured to give it a more pleasing effect. A large mirror, reflecting the garden, further enhances the beauty of the picture, making the flowers themselves stand out more conspicuously, like a picture in a gilded frame. Bewitching Paradise For over two hours I lingered in this bewitching Paradise, with its hundreds of different species of the flower kingdom, while Mrs. MacMillan patiently explained to me the names and habits of each plant. To one as ignorant as I of horticulture, her knowledge seemed to verge on the uncanny, for she talked of this flower and that as if they were close friends. Amongst this seemingly endless list of names I managed to remember a few of the more common ones—the perennials which follow each other in season. For instance, daffodils and daisies make their debut in May, as do also the lovely forget-me-nots. This riot of glory usually continues till the middle of June, when it gradually fades away, giving way to the last half of June and July a chance to display the iris, peonies, larkspur and Oriental poppy. August and September flaunt the hollyhocks, gladioli, etc. This subsiding to this garden a continuous dream-land of blossoms that makes the place hauntingly inviting until fall frosts bring ruin and destruction. And that not forget to mention them, for this particular plot contains some of the most beautiful ones I ever have looked on. One of these rare, exquisite varieties is a Polyantha named Gloria Mundi. Other species found here include: Agnes Grootendorst, Tallman, Etolie de Holland, Countess (Van) and many more. Around the bird bath, in the center of the lawn, smiles a group of Madonna lilies, those delicate, fragrant beauties which are the pride of all true-hearted horticulturists. What garden would be complete without some? Specimens from the MacMillan flower gardens have won many prizes at the Provincial Exhibition, including the coveted Lieutenant Governor's annual prize for the best floral display. This prize she captured three times in the few years that it has been offered, while her gladioli carried off the honors at least once at the Toronto Gladioli Show. Expert Horticulturist Mrs. MacMillan is a member of the Massachusetts Horticultural Society and is proud of the fact that her gardens are wholly the result of her own individual efforts. Reading and personal experience have given this busy woman a thorough knowledge of her subject. A tidy collection of books covering every phase of this fascinating hobby gazed at me from neat rows in their respective shelves, but how she found time to digest their contents while taking care of her gardens and home duties will always be a mystery to this writer. Upwards of 1,000 persons visit this shrine of beauty each year. They represent many provinces, states and countries. Glancing through her record book, I discovered that on one day in 1941 visitors from every province in Canada, as well as from many states of the U.S.A., took a peek at this little flowerland. No fee is charged by the owner. There is, however, a small cash-box where visitors may deposit their dimes if they so wish. This fund, together with receipts from cut-flowers in season, goes back into maintenance—not nearly enough, however, to show any profit from the venture, which must cost hundreds of dollars each year in upkeep alone. Much time is spent in showing

TORONTO, July 30-(CP)—The Toronto Trades and Labor Council will renew its efforts to have women workers taken off late shifts following the brutal assault of a girl worker here early today. President William Jenoves announced tonight. The girl, beaten as she walked toward a street car in hospital suffering from a double fracture of the jaw. Police are still searching for her attacker. Mr. Jenoves said he would bring the whole question up at the next meeting of the council. "It is a difficult problem and I think the only solution is for war plants not to place girls on late shifts," he said "I believe this could be done without adversely affecting production."
