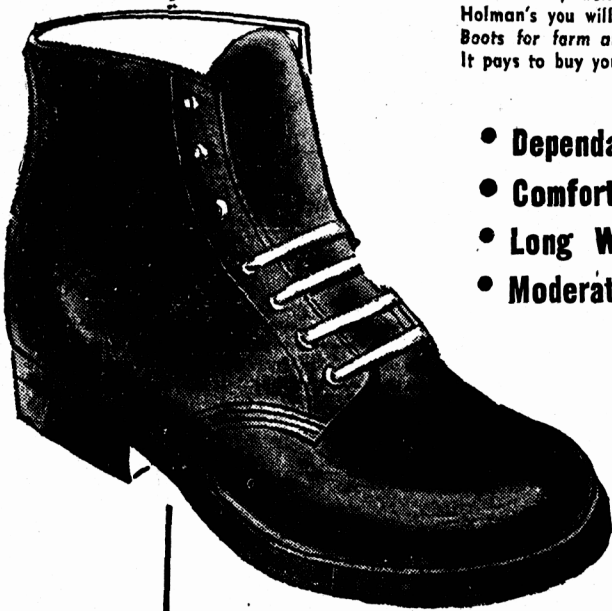

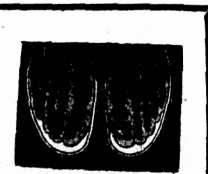

The President Mrs. Joseph Callaghan presided while Miss Bertha J. Bowness acted as secretary. The guest speaker was Mr. Merritt Callaghan, B. A. Supervisor of schools. The following program was discussed:

1. Grading and Promotion of Pupils.
  - (a) What are your opinions regarding the present practice of administering a Standardized Group Achievement Test of Grade VIII pupils as a guide to the teacher in determining their fitness for promotion to Grade IX?
  - (b) How can uniformity of standards be attained in the matter of grading? It is suggested that the group decide general principles that all teachers can follow.
  - (c) What is your opinion of the fact that in 1947 out of a total of 689 pupils who wrote the entrance examinations July 356 (or 51.7%) were successful?
2. Continuity of Teaching Service in the District.

  - (c) How can more permanency in a district's teaching service be attained?
3. Professional Ethics.
  - (a) It is suggested that the Code of Ethics outlined on Pages 17, 18 and 19 of the booklet—"Act of Incorporation, By-Laws, Rules of Order and Code of Ethics of the P. E. I. F." be read and discussed.
  - (b) Annual Reports and Statistical Returns.
    - (a) How do the Register, Monthly and Annual Report forms advertise the teacher?
    - (b) Supervisor will outline some of the common errors made by teachers in filling out Annual Reports and Statistical Returns.
  - (c) Why should teachers become more active in advising School Boards in the matter of property improvements?
  - (d) What general advice should you give to School Boards re: blackboards, new furniture for seating pupils, lighting, heating, construction of new toilets, scrubbing of classrooms?
  - (e) How does the Department of Education assist local School Boards in the matter of (a) building a new school; (b) improving present property and equipment?
6. Intercollegiate Field Days.
  - (a) Would you favour the inauguration of intercollegiate field days? Discuss advantages and disadvantages.
