IN MEMORIAM MR. JOSEPH S. HUME

Flin Flon Mine Is Sold To U. S. People

THE PAS, Man., Nov. 24—Official announcement has been made here of the sale of the Flin Flon copper mine for \$3,000,000 to United States mining interests, with the former owners of the mine, the Mining Corporation, retaining a 10 per cent. interest in the production. It was also announced that development work on the property will commence immediately on a large scale. The names of the interests concerned were not made public, but it is rumored that the Guggenheim interests made the purchase. Material for the erection of a refining plant will be freighted in this winter.

The session of St. Andrew's Church, Cardigan and Malcolm Nicholson, Head of Montague, assisted Mr. MacVicar, Rev. A. S. Stewart who is rendering great service to the cause there, gave the prayer of ordination. The large congregation who witnessed that solemn service were reminded that Presbyterianism stands for a system of doctrines that will never see the decrepitude of old age, but will live in the un fading freshness of self-renewing youth and the unbroken vigor of manhood to the end of time, and will outlive time itself.

—MEMORIAL SERVICES.—The congregations of Malpeque and Kensington churches were favored on Sunday morning and night with two addresses by Rev. Dr. Genge. The subject of the address at Malpeque at three o'clock in the afternoon being: "The Lessons of the Great War." In the evening at Kensington the subject of the gifted gentleman's discourse was: "Queenly Wifehood and Royal Motherhood." In this discourse the speaker paid a worthy tribute to the life of the late lamented Queen Alexandra. She was the daughter of a Sea King; she was the choice of the Prince and the choice of the Queen and the choice of Parliament, and, I believe, the chosen of God, to wield an influence for good in the affairs of the Empire, and we may add the words of the wise man: "Many daughters have done virtuously, but thou excellest them all." Her great personal beauty was eclipsed only by the beauty of her character. To her late husband, King Edward VII, she was the sheet anchor to windward in every gale. To her son the present King, she was his guiding star, and she bequeathed to her young son-in-law, the young man who made him the Sailor King, whose love has been for the navy, the bulwarks of Britain's strength. To her grandson she has imparted the lesson of duty to God and to the Nation, of which he will, if his life be spared, be the leader. Measure life by loss instead of

gain, not by wine drunk, but by wine poured forth, for love's strength standeth in love's sacrifice, and who suffers most hath most to give." The altar was covered with the Union Jack, and from its folds were draped streamers and rosettes of crepe. Men died in the war sacrificing their life in the hope that it would be the last war—the war to end war. Our choice lies between whole-hearted and full international co-operation for world justice, world security, and world peace; or growing international, ill-will, suspicion and increasing war preparations, which must bring another war. What is our choice? We need a world court of justice where differences between nations can be settled by law, and the offending nation treated as the individual offender. Make war illegal, make it criminal. "Thou shalt not kill" is as much the commandment to the nation as to the individual. Statesmanship has failed to consummate the desired end. The church must end war. Tariff walls and grabbing commercial institutions have been the causes of war. To you we throw the torch, 'tis yours to hold it high. If ye break faith we will not sleep though poppies grow in Flanders field. The Honor Roll was displayed and among the names are those of men of all creeds.
