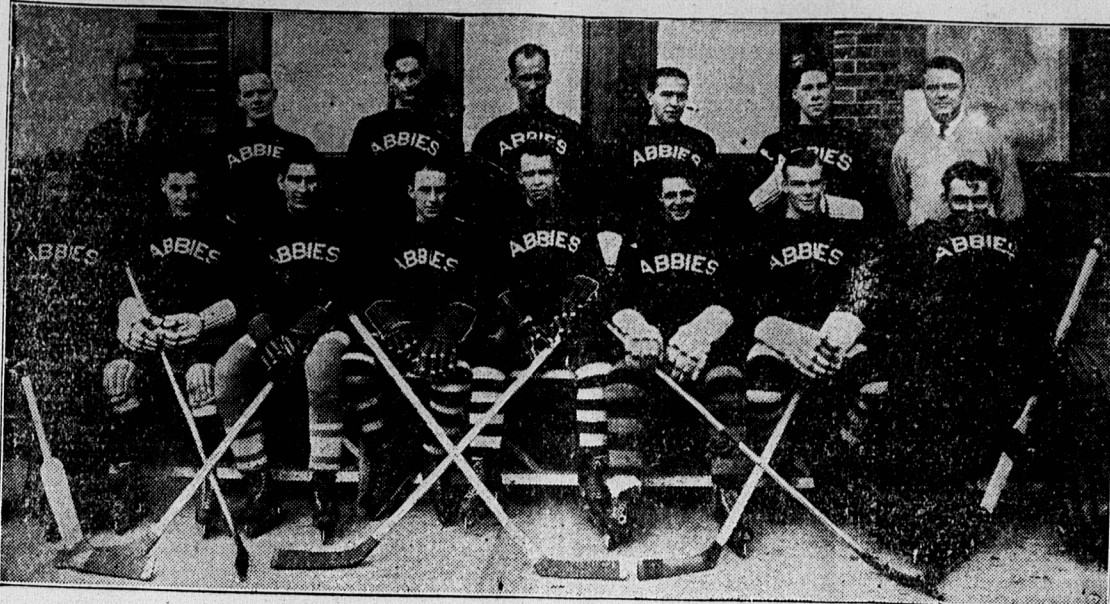

At 10:35, Stewart, Levin left winger, who reminds the writer of Webster, stellar Fredericton right winger, rifled a hard shot into the corner of the net, having accepted a neat pass from "Pud" Whitlock. MacInnis made a sensational save on Whitlock and a minute later McKee almost scored for Southport. Campbell, Levin right winger, scored on a pass from Ferguson at 15:35. Levins were using splendid combination and MacInnis was acrobatically stopping shots from all angles. As the period ended, he somehow stopped a sizzler from McCabe.

NEW PLAN DOOMS PEASANT FARMING

MOSCOW, Dec. 23.—Russia's second five-year plan which becomes effective in 1933 contemplates absolute elimination of the individual peasant farmer and a doubling of the crop bearing area.

Complete collectivization of the land with 75 per cent. in collective farms and the remainder in state farms is provided for in a preliminary draft of the agricultural phase of the new programme.

Less than two-thirds of the area under cultivation this year was tilled by the collective and state farms.
