RT. HON. ARTHUR MEIGHEN, LEADER OF THE OPPOSITION GIVEN ENTHUSIASTIC RECEPTION BY ISLAND ELECTORS

At Strand and Prince Edward Theatres Last Night—Senator G. D. Robertson Also Addresses the Audiences which Packed Both Houses—Both Make Brilliant Reviews of Political Situation and Severely Flail the Mackenzie King Government—Local Speakers Also Take Part—Opposition Leader's Voice Weakened by Strain of His Strenuous Campaign.

(Canadian Press) Instead of a single meeting, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative Leader, found two large halls crowded to capacity when he arrived in Charlottetown for his only Prince Edward Island engagement last night.

Prince Edward Island, found difficulty in speaking at first owing to the strain which recent operations had made on his voice.

Both Mr. Meighen and Senator Robertson struck a new note when they gave some indication of their views of the situation. Mr. Meighen predicted that the Liberals would lose heavily in the Maritimes, and that the Conservatives would gain perhaps thirty seats in Quebec.

There was no possibility of a Liberal Government functioning without the assistance of the Progressives in the next parliament, there are certainly going to be fewer Liberals.

Indications are that they will have to rely on the Progressives more than ever. The Conservative leader asserted.

Again Hon. G. D. Robertson, who followed Mr. Meighen, pointed to certain things which, he thought, indicated a reversal of sentiment from the last election.

Mr. Meighen denied reports that he favored higher freight rates for any section of Canada and accused the government with increasing the debt.

Mr. Stewart informed the meeting that Mr. Meighen had been under a great strain owing to large open-air meetings, and his voice had suffered severely.

Snow and Cold In Alberta

CALGARY, Sept. 18.—From warm Indian summer weather on Tuesday, when the barometer soared as high as 76 above, this city was caught in the grip of the first cold wave of the season today.

Mr. Meighen, whose voice at the opening was very low, and almost inaudible in parts of the hall, asked his listeners to bear with him in the hope that it would gain in volume as he went on.

The principles which the Conservative party had advocated in the last election campaign were intact, Mr. Meighen said.

He turned to the railway situation. The Government had "sat by in shivering impotence" in the matter of the railways.

"I never said anything of the kind," Mr. Meighen asserted. All he had stated was that statutory rates should not be granted to one part of the country and one alone.

He reiterated his proposal for assistance to the Maritime Provinces and Western Canada from the treasury which would enable these sections of the Dominion to get their products into the world markets.

The Conservative Leader said it was the habit of Liberal leaders to contend that the tariff was of little interest to the Maritime Provinces.
