The authorities announced only competent men will be re-employed. Police, fire and scavenger departments are principally affected. The men this afternoon formed themselves into a local of the National Catholic Union, and will resist the movement of the authorities.

Annual Meeting Children's Aid Society

So much interest has lately been created in "the most valuable asset of the community"—By Miss Holman and others engaged in the promoting of Social Service and Child Welfare—that there is likely to be a large attendance at the annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society on the evening of Monday next. By the courtesy of His Worship the Mayor and the City Councilors, the Annual meeting of the Society and all interested in Child Welfare is this year to be held in the City Council Chamber. It is expected that the discussion will, after routine business, refer particularly to the expediency of extending to the whole Province the provisions of the Acts under which the Children's Aid Society carries on its work. In the past year Children's Aid Societies for King's and Prince Counties were established; and the extension of the Children's Aid Society of Charlottetown to all parts of Queen's County has been seriously considered. But the operation of Children's Aid Societies outside of Charlottetown is impossible for want of money. In Charlottetown itself the work of the Children's Aid Society is possible, under existing circumstances, only by combining the City Grant for the supervision of truant from the schools with the grant of the Provincial Legislature for the care of dependent and delinquent children. If there were one Society for the whole Province and if the amounts voted by the City, town and Provincial Governments, were combined so that a sufficient salary for its agent could be paid, and a Detention Home maintained for the dependent and delinquent children of the whole Province could be effectively cared for at a proportionately decreased cost,—as in Nova Scotia.

EMPIRE EXHIBITION INQUIRY DEMANDED

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The Duke of Devonshire's statement yesterday that the members of the British Empire Exhibition were opposed to an outside inquiry into the management, but were willing to consent to one if the Government thought it advisable, is the latest development in connection with that much debated affair. One of the Canadian Provincial Agents General, on discovering that he had been named a vice president of the Exhibition Association without authority, has asked that his name be removed. Meanwhile nearly every London newspaper has endorsed the suggestion that an inquiry be held into the management of the Exhibition. To act with common sense, according to the moment, is the best wisdom.
