—NURSE DEAD.—The death occurred at the Prince County Hospital on Sunday last after an illness of three days of influenza followed by pneumonia of Miss Gillis a trained nurse whose home is in Bradabane.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. SIMON McDONALD

The death occurred in this city, Monday, after a week's illness from pneumonia, of Simon McDonald, aged 38 years. The deceased had been a man of strong physique and was an excellent citizen. He had been employed in the freight shed of the P. E. I. Railway when he took ill and was also formerly employed with the late M. P. Hogan. He leaves to mourn a widow and seven young children, to whom much sympathy will be extended.

MR. W. D. STEWART

Mr. Andrew Bowness of Kensington near Boston, Mass., of his brother in law, W. D. Stewart. The deceased a native of this province, where he was at one time very prominent in political life, being Commissioner of Public Works in the Davies Administration from 1876 to 1878. He represented the New London District for a number of years and was an able legislator and effective platform speaker. He formerly conducted a commission and shipping business in Charlottetown. He was about 79 years of age and had been a resident of the United States for many years. His family are residing there. Two brothers and a sister in this province survive him, viz: James B. Stewart in Roseneath, Daniel C. Stewart and Mrs. Docherty in Cherry Valley.

THE LATE DR. McEWEN

The funeral of the late Dr. Henry E. McEwen, who died last Wednesday morning in Summerside took place on Thursday under the auspices of the I.O.O.F., of which the deceased was a prominent and honored member, Rev G. S. Mitchell officiating at the home and grave. The remains were conveyed to O'Leary and laid to rest in the family plot in Bloomfield Cemetery, the funeral being one of the largest ever seen in the district. The late Dr. McEwen was one of the most distinguished physicians in the province. He was a past president of the P. E. Island Medical Association and at the time of his death President of the Prince County Medical Society and a Trustee of the Prince County Hospital. He was a native of St. Peters, being the son of the late Mr. Emanuel McEwen and in early life taught school near his home. Twenty-two years ago he graduated from Dalhousie University and for about a year was surgeon on the D. G. S. Gullivare. He then settled at O'Leary and enjoyed an exceptionally wide practice there and throughout the surrounding country. Nine years ago he went to the Old Country and took a post-graduate course in London and Edinburgh. Last May he acquired the residence and practice at Summerside of Dr. John Jardine and had since resided in Summerside, deeply respected by an exceptionally wide circle of friends and admirers who now mourn his early demise. There are left to mourn a widow, formerly Miss Annie Warburton McKay, of Freeland, Lot 11, Erie brothers and one sister, namely Messrs John, James and Benjamin McEwen, and Mrs. Wood, all of St. Peters; also three half-brothers, now residing in the West.

MR. ROBERT FRIZZELL

The death of Mr. Robert Frizzell, formerly of Freetown, occurred at his home in Stanchel, on Oct. 7th, 1918 in the 82nd year of his age. Although in feeble health for some time the end came as a shock to his many friends. Deceased was a consistent member of the Presbyterian Church, and when health permitted his place in a meeting was seldom vacant. He was left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, six sons and two daughters, viz: Hugh of St. John's, Robert and Joseph, New Brunswick; Samuel, in O'Leary; John in Beauséjour; and James at home; Mrs. H. M. Gambell of Gambell's Corner; Mrs. Robert Reeves in Freetown; Miss Emma and Miss Margaret at home. All six brothers and five sisters besides a large circle of relatives and friends. The funeral took place on Oct. 9th interment being made in Summerside cemetery, by the side of his wife. The service was conducted at the house by Rev. John Sterling assisted by Rev. D. McLean, Charlottetown. The service at the grave was conducted by the Calvin L. O. L. of which deceased had been a faithful member for sixty-four years, six of the Brothers acting pall bearers. He took part in some of the fiercest fighting in the big drive in March and April. He was badly wounded in the jaw in June last and being unable to return to France was invalided home. —DIED OF WOUNDS.—The sad message was received by Mrs. Alice Thomas on Monday that her son Pte. W. H. Thomas, infantry, previously reported dangerously ill, had died of wounds in No. thirty Casualty Station Oct. 18th gunshot wound in chest. Pte. Thomas was one of Summerside's most promising young men. He was 21 years old and was a member of the 105 Battalion. He took part in much heavy fighting and was wounded three times. His mother and sister Miss Ada have the sympathy of the whole community in their sorrow.

—WEDDING BELLS.—A very pretty wedding took place at St. Mark's Rectory, Kensington, on Wednesday evening, Oct. 9 at 6.30 when Miss Beulah E. Sutherland and Mr. David J. Caseley were united in the holy bonds of matrimony by the Rev. C. W. Neish. The young bride looked very winsome in a lovely gown of blue duchess silk and was attended by her cousin, Miss Clara Leard, who was prettily dressed in brown silk. The groom, who is one of Spring Valley's prosperous young farmers was attended by his cousin Mr. Roy Adams of Sea View. After the ceremony the bridal party drove to the bride's home in Spring Valley, where a delicious supper was served, the immediate relatives of the bride and groom being present.
