—TOWN COUNCIL.—The first regular monthly meeting of the Alberton Town Council was held in the Court House on Tuesday evening, Mayor Lawson and all the Councillors being present. The chief business before the Council was the appointment of the civil officers for the year and resulted as follows: Police Magistrate Wilfred Taitton; Town Clerk, R. H. Reid; Police Officer, Joseph Brown; Assessors, Alex. Matthews and E. O. Barbour; Auditors, J. W. Waugh and W. McLean; Fence Viewers, John Cunningham and Jesse Matthews (Chairman of Committees); Finance, E. R. Burke; Streets, E. I. Thomson; Sidewalks, Howard Clark; Police, M. M. Foley; Fire, E. A. McIte; Light Geo. Gard. Routine business occupied the attention of the Council for the remainder of the evening and adjournment until Tuesday, March 20th was made in order to consider the report of Fire Committee re housing of fire apparatus and other pressing business. The public evinced considerable interest in the proceedings by a large attendance, this being the first council meeting in the history of the town at which citizens were amply accommodated.—A.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. WILLIAM SMALLWOOD.
The subject of this sketch had reached the ripe age of four score and four years at the date of her death on the 13th inst. Her maiden name was Charlotte Rattray and she was born March, 1833, her father's home being on the St. Peter's Road. After her marriage to William Smallwood, she lived up to a few years ago, at Mt. Herbert, where a family of five sons was raised, three of them now living Henry at Bunbury; Frank, at East Royal; and Herbert, in Winnipeg Manitoba. Since the decease of Mr. Smallwood, five years ago, the widow has resided with her son, Frank from whose residence her funeral was held on Thursday, March 15th. Rev. E. S. Weeks of Pownal officiated being assisted by Rev. Mr. F. H. Littlejohns, of Charlottetown. Interment was made at Mt. Herbert. Mrs. Smallwood was a woman of fine Christian character and of most amiable disposition. Her passing was calm and full of the hope of the resurrection of the Just.

Mrs. Wood was a daughter of Mr. M. Owen and was born at Frenchfort near Marshfield, P. E. I., seventy eight years ago, and passed away a few days ago. She married Robert Wood, of Millview, early in life and to this union a family of six belongs:

Her remains were laid away in the town of her late residence. Mrs. Wood was for many years a member of the Methodist Church, at Millview. She rests from her labors and her works do follow her.

MRS. MARGARET MALONE.

There passed peacefully away at her home in Minneapolis, Minn., on Feb. 22nd one of earth's noble women in the person of Mrs. Margaret Malone. Deceased had been ailing for the past year, but nothing serious was anticipated until three months ago, when she was removed to the hospital of that place, but all that medical skill and kind nursing proved to no avail. Deceased was a well known here having resided in Charlottetown for many years removing to Minneapolis ten years ago. She was a highly respected woman loved by all who knew her.
