**MONTREAL, May 18.**—Receipts of livestock for today's markets amounted to but 14 cattle, one sheep, 462 hogs and 199 calves. Trading was somewhat slow as most of the butchers obtained their supplies earlier in the week. Packers were offering \$10.75 for thick smooth hogs, and \$1.00 per hog bonus on selects 50 cents per hog cut on shops and \$1.00 per hog cut on heavies. A couple of loads were sold to local butchers at \$11.00 flat. There was very little demand for calves. The quality was considerably better than yesterday but the few buyers on hand were offering even money or less. One lot of just ordinary quality was sold for \$6.50. The balance were being held for higher prices.

**THE MARKETS**

(Canadian Press)

**MONTREAL, Que., May 18.**—Extreme dullness marked the export trade in grain here today there being practically no demand from foreign buyers. The only business of importance in the local cash grain market was the sale of 100,000 bushels of No. 1 northern wheat for export account at thirteen cents per bushel over the Winnipeg May option, C.I.F. Montreal.

Owing to the further advance in corn futures at Chicago, spot prices for cash corn were marked up another two cents per bushel. Car lots of Argentine were quoted at \$1.04, American No. 3 yellow at \$1.02, and sample corn at 99 cents per bushel, ex-store. Canadian western oats were unchanged. The local and export trade in spring wheat grades of flour was again active but the tone was firm. Winter wheat flour was steady with a small trade passing. The demand for all lines of milled slackened off somewhat but prices were unchanged. The inquiry for standard grades of rolled oats showed no improvement. A weaker feeling developed in the hay market and prices were reduced fifteen cents per ton. Car lots of No. 2 timothy hay sold at \$14.00 per ton. The weakness was attributed to the liberal supplies coming forward and the limited demand. The trade in eggs continued fairly active and values were steady. The receipts were 2,876 cases.

A moderate amount of business was done in potatoes and the undertone was firm. Car lots of Quebec grades were quoted at \$2.00 to \$2.10 per bag of 90 pounds in bulk, ex-track. The weakness which had characterized the butter market of late was again the main feature today and prices scored a further decline of 3/4 cents per pound. The demand continued quiet.
