CAMPAIGN STRIKES UP GRADE

Grand Total Last Night Reached \$141,130.

Just as predicted, the great volunteer corps in the \$250,000 campaign for the new Prince Edward Island Hospital struck the up-grade again yesterday, and reported \$7,215 at Rally No. 8 last evening (Friday) in the Social Hall of Trinity United Church, thus carrying the grand total to date up to \$141,130. Again the night's total of subscriptions was 133. Almost 2,000 persons have contributed to the campaign thus far, the exact grand total of subscriptions being 1,942 in number. It is expected that more than 3,000 contributions will be received by November 5, when the campaign is to close. There will be three more report meetings—on the 9th and 10th Rally suppers on Monday and Tuesday respectively, and the Victory Supper on Wednesday.

Chairman H. Hooper Horne's report for the Allied Towns Committee—\$2,501—shows that the people of Kings and Queens Counties outside of Charlottetown also are taking a serious view of their obligation to the Hospital. Nineteen of the 47 Provincial District committees have reported thus far, their respective grand totals to date being as follows: Bonshaw, \$525; Cornwall, \$250; Cumberland, \$456; Fredericton, \$301.50; Georgetown, \$501; Harrington, \$321; Hunter River, \$287; Kingsboro, \$128; Marshfield, \$445; Millville, \$1265; Milton, \$960; Mt. Stewart, \$310; Murray River, \$299; New Glasgow, \$616; Nine Mile Creek, \$172; Souris, \$1290; Stanley Bridge, \$53; Victoria, \$245.50.

Inter-Empire Trade

(Continued from Page 4)

"It should be remembered that the population of Canada, Australia, and New Zealand are almost wholly European and that such coloured people as may live in these countries, excluding, of course, the very small quota of aboriginal inhabitants that have not been brought into close contact with civilization, have for the most part, attained to a standard of living nearly on a par with that of white peoples. Generally speaking, therefore, the purchasing power of the people in these dominions is as great, if not greater than that of the inhabitants of Great Britain. On the other hand in South Africa there are only one and a half million Europeans and probably a small percentage of the coloured population that approach a white standard of living."

The percentage of white people to the native population in India, Ceylon and British Malaya is, of course, very small indeed. By contrast, the inhabitants of most of the foreign countries mentioned have Europeans of similar standards of living."

To attempt to confine the trade of the Empire to the lands of the Empire is to abandon for the Empire the real advantage of foreign trade. Throughout the Empire there will be surplus produce in Great Britain of manufactured goods and in the colonies of raw materials and food stuffs which must be disposed of in other than Empire countries. After all is said and done, as Mr. Gronoda substitutes a certain quantity of overseas Empire produce for raw materials and surplus produce in Great Britain, the Empire would be aiming at an object which would be impracticable as it would be selfish (if it could be brought about) but if this generation is to justify its heritage we must strive for a faster development of the unexploited resources of the Commonwealth of British nations in the interest not only of the British people but of the world at large.

It is, however, obvious from the figures so ably furnished by Mr. Gronoda in his book, from the most reliable sources, that there is an enormous field awaiting exploitation within the Empire markets by enterprising British manufacturers and it is to be remembered that most of the Empire workers give preferential treatment to imports from Britain. On the other hand Britain must reciprocate and give preference to the overseas Empire countries on agricultural products and raw materials imported. The nature and degree of preference both in the case of the United Kingdom and the Overseas Empire might be by way of super-taxes on foreign goods. The rates against Britain being the same as before the result being a substitution of a certain quantity of British goods for Foreign and thus the only Colonial manufacturing countries, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and India would not suffer. The same policy could be adopted by the United Kingdom towards overseas Empire countries in regard to food stuffs and raw materials and thus said and done, as Mr. Gronoda substitutes a certain quantity of overseas Empire produce for raw materials and surplus produce in Great Britain, the Empire would be aiming at an object which would be impracticable as it would be selfish (if it could be brought about) but if this generation is to justify its heritage we must strive for a faster development of the unexploited resources of the Commonwealth of British nations in the interest not only of the British people but of the world at large.

On Adam Smith's principles, trade within the Empire, other things being equal, is more advantageous to the Empire than external trade. But what do we find in Mr. Gronoda's excellent book "Empire Stock-taking" as shown below, as regards cost.

 Canada owes the United Kingdom \$427,158,948.

Here is another startling fact. The United States in 1928 imported goods to the value of \$5,128,809,279 to all countries and imported goods to the value of \$4,091,120,064, thus showing a favorable trade balance of \$1,037,689,215.

From the above quoted figures it will be seen that the United Kingdom and Canada supplied the United States with practically the whole of the favorable trade balance with over 100 countries of the world.

In the light of the foregoing facts and the decrease in Empire trade by over 25 percent since 1915 the time is overdue for developing reciprocal trade between Great Britain and the overseas Empire, which would go a long way in curing the unemployment in Great Britain and the overseas Empire countries.

To sum up what is wanted and should be aimed at is a policy adverse to every kind of monopoly and favourable to everything that increases the prosperity of the people throughout the Empire.
