

Train Unloads Human Cargo At Doorstep

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ALICE DEVINE

The death occurred on Monday, February 22nd, 1937, of Mrs. Alice Devine, at her home, 320 Fitzroy St., Charlottetown, P. E. Island, in her 76th year.

Mrs. Devine was the widow of the late Francis Devine who predeceased her about 14 years ago. She had fallen ill about two months previous to her demise and after passing what was thought to be the crisis of her illness, hopes were held for her ultimate recovery, but God willed otherwise and death came peacefully to her, surrounded by members of her family and fortified by the consoling last rites of the Catholic Church, to the teaching of which, she had ever been faithful and comforted in this faith by the frequent visits of her beloved friends and spiritual advisers, the Reverend Fathers McCordie and Dougan and whose visits also proved a great source of consolation to her loved ones who stood by her bedside and watched that precious life slowly ebb away.
