# FAR EASTERN WAR SHOULD BE AN OBJECT LESSON TO CANADA

Lord Dundonald, Before the Dominion Artillery Association, Dwelt on This Country Being Prepared for Emergencies—He Wants an Army of 100,000 Men.

OTTAWA, Feb. 29.—(Special)—At the annual meeting of the Dominion Artillery Association today Lord Minto said that his interest in the association would continue long after he had gone back home to the old country. Lord Roberts had once remarked to him in London he was greatly impressed with the efficiency of the Canadian artillery in South Africa, and the opinion was one that Lord Minto cordially endorsed.

Lord Dundonald said that last year he had emphasized before the association the need of the Canadian artillery. Since then some improvements had been made. "Within two days," declared the general "an establishment has passed which will give a citizen army on paper. Whether the army on paper will become a realized fact depends upon the people of the country. In my own mind I have no doubt but the people of Canada will rise to the occasion and join the ranks."

"I have traveled the country from one end to the other and found everywhere the same spirit and intention to serve. There are three ways of raising an army—by conscription, you may have your youth slaves to other men's wills, but that is not the method that would commend itself to a free country. Another expedient way is to have a paid army, and a third is the citizen's army. Even if the people resist, it can never be made effective unless the public and their representatives realize that we require the equipment and perfected organization and the money to provide them."

"We have likely had an object lesson upon the necessity of being prepared for war. We see the difference between a power that is ready to strike and one that requires two or three weeks to get ready. I think that lesson will be taken to heart throughout the length and breadth of this country, and that when parliament meets we will find the army of 100,000 now on paper, made a reality, our artillery improved and provided with equipment so that when danger comes we may be ready."

At the meeting this afternoon, Colonel King, of Guelph, was elected president; Lieut.-Colonel Hibbard, of Montreal, first vice-president; Lieut.-Colonel Hendrie, of Hamilton, second vice-president; Lieut.-Colonel Davidson, Guelph, third vice-president; Lieut. Colonel Costigan, Montreal, fourth vice-president. Lieutenant Tooley, of the headquarters staff, was elected sec-

retary, and Lieut.-Colonel Hurdman, treasurer. The council is as follows: Lieut.-Colonels D. T. Irwin, D. McGee, Crawford, Lindsay, J. R. Armstrong, William Nicol, P. F. Co'e and Capt. E. W. B. Morrison.
