Jellicoe Has Wide Powers in Misison

VANCOUVER, Aug. 12.—A despatch to the Vancouver Province from Sydney, N. S., says: "It is believed that Viscount Jellicoe's report on the naval defense of Australia will be of the frankest nature, demanding that the Commonwealth recognize its obligations of Empire and condemning its past policy. In future Australia will take an important part in a deeply considered Imperial scheme in which the Commonwealth will be allotted the duty of preserving the interests of the Empire in the southern Pacific. The China squadron will consist of a powerful fleet guarding against a possible eastern menace. "In the most informed circles it is the growing opinion that Jellicoe's mission is more than Australian in its scope, covering an investigation into the entire future Pacific question, including an inquiry into Japan's commercial penetration of the British Dominions and Asia, which the keenest Australian minds consider increases the precariousness of this sparsely peopled continent. Figures in possession of the Commonwealth Government show that Japan's trade with the Pacific quadrupled during the war period, while Japan's trade inlandward only increased 50 per cent. Australian public opinion is already uneasy about the increase of Japan's imports and sees fresh significance in these facts."

Dramatic Ending To Bomb Mystery

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 11.—The mystery of the bombing of the house of Oscar Lawlor, former United States district attorney, which may result in his death, ended at 12:30 o'clock this morning when body of Chas. H. McGwire, assistant chief engineer for Los Angeles city board of public works, crashed 160 feet to the pavement of New High street. The man who plotted the death of the attorney and the murder of his family, leaped to death from the 14th floor of the hall of records when he realized that the bombing crime had been conclusively fastened upon him. In his effort to escape the fee from an estate of which he was administrator before being removed by the action of Mr. Lawlor, he destroyed Mr. Lawlor's house, brought the victim and his wife to the doors of death and then ended the crime cycle by breaking every bone in his body in his leap to death. The denouement of the bomb outrage was as unexpected as it was shocking and sensational. While the theory that the bomb was planted by terrorists, who were supposed to be fleeing through the desert to the Mexican border, was being exploited, the police and detectives were quietly but effectively weaving a net of evidence about McGwire in which every thread was vital. When the word "indictment" was mentioned at the end of three hours of grueling examination in which McGwire was made to realize that his cleverness had not hoodwinked the district attorney or police chief, he turned pale, stepped to a water cooler, and then dashed for the open window. A detective who seized him was thrown against a radiator. With his eyes blinded by blood from a six inch wound in his forehead, he held to the desperate trapped man. McGwire, his body out of the window, made one last effort, and escaped the clutches of the wounded man and dashed to the pavement 11 stories below.

Hot Comment on Expenses of Britain

LONDON, August 12.—Great Britain's financial conditions, which J. Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, told the House on the last night, shows that the country is headed for bankruptcy, was brought forward today by the newspapers as the most vital problem of the hour, even overshadowing labor troubles. The Chancellor's statement recently that British expenses are four and one-half million pounds daily came as a distinct shock to the country but was emphasized by the details given by Mr. Chamberlain last night. It was remarked by some of the newspapers that this constituted a criticism of the Cabinet of which he is a member, but his view was endorsed by Premier Lloyd George. Blame House of Commons Virtually every newspaper in London today joins a chorus of condemnation of the national expenditures and newspapers hostile to the Government criticized it for "its rash, wasteful extravagance." The House of Commons, it was remarked, was largely responsible because it surrendered control of expenditures. The Daily News declared "even the present House of Commons is at last at least at the Government's reckless prodigality and its total lack of any policy designed to stay the country's headlong career toward bankruptcy." Pick Army and Navy The newspapers fixed on the army and navy as the chief causes of extravagance, condemned the maintenance of the present great military force and deprecated the proposal of the United States to create "a standing army of a half million" which, it said, "may well be hailed as a setback to the whole cause of disarmament." The Daily Mail, which announced that the forthcoming second report of the Air Ministry will contain amazing revelations of extravagance more sensational than any yet divulged, said that the Government's extravagance is one of the direct causes of the labor unrest. An Orgy of Spending The country is indulging in an orgy of spending, several of the newspapers remarked, and is contributing thereby to the high cost of living. People who temporarily have relatively great wealth, it was said, are willing to pay any price rather than forego gratification of their desires, so that while necessities of life are higher than ever there never was so much money spent on luxuries. All those who deal in jewelry, automobiles, costly apparel, and entertainments of all sorts, were said to be doing unprecedented business. The cry against profiteers was said by the newspapers to be voiced by these reckless spenders as well as by the poor, but actual cases of profiteering are rarely followed up successfully. In this connection, it was said the measures being taken in the United States to reduce the cost of living are being watched with much interest.

Leader King Wants Laurier's Old Seat

Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, the new leader of the Laurier party, seems to be peculiarly identified with Quebec. His election as leader has been widely celebrated in that province by the anti-conscriptionists. It is very generally believed in Quebec that Mr. King was nominated by Sir Wilfrid Laurier as his successor, and he is now regarded as "quite one of them." Mr. King would like to sit in the House for Quebec East, Sir Wilfrid's old seat, but if the provisions of the Elections Act are strictly adhered to it will be at least eight weeks before he can be elected, and not, as stated in The Journal on Friday, would result in the party being without a leader in the House at the fall session. If, however, an acclamation for Mr. King were assured in Quebec East, it is said there is a way of getting him elected in a shorter time, and this method, it is understood, is being carefully considered. Sir Robert Borden is, of course, anxious to have his new Minister of Finance and Minister of Agriculture in the House at the coming session, and doubtless will be disappointed to assist in the early return of Mr. King to the Commons, if the other side will assist in the early return of Sir Henry Drayton and Dr. Tolmie. It has been figured out that in a rural constituency—that is, one not containing a city or town with a population of one thousand—a contested election could be brought off in the first week in September. It is supposed, therefore, that such a constituency, but so desirous is Mr. Henry Drayton and Dr. Tolmie. In other constituencies an election would take from seven to ten weeks. Quebec East is of course not a rural constituency, but so desirous is Mr. King of trying to fill the shoes of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in every way that he will probably prefer to wait for Quebec East than to accept return in another riding. As has been said, however, his election even for Quebec East may be facilitated if methods now being considered are found advisable.—Ottawa Journal.

Passenger Airplane Leaves for Copenhagen

(Special to the Guardian) PARIS, August 14.—A passenger airplane, a sister craft of the Goliath which flew to Morocco on Monday, left here today for Copenhagen, an airplane distance of about 650 miles. The machine carried two pilots, several passengers and French and Danish diplomatic records. A stop near Amsterdam was planned.
