### Arabs Threaten To Cancel Oil Concessions

CAIRO, Feb. 22 —(AP)—A reliable Arab source said Saturday that some British and American oil concessions in the Middle East may be cancelled if the United Nations tries to carry out the partition of Palestine by force. The informant said the Arab League Political Committee agreed to recommend cancellations to such countries as Iraq and Saudi Arabia as an Arab reply. The political committee reached this decision when it urged an economic boycott of countries supporting Palestine partition.

### Falls Overboard And Is Rescued After 3 Hours

ABOARD THE S. S. SANTA CLARA IN THE CARIBBEAN, Feb. 22—(AP)—A sailor who fell overboard and was rescued after three hours told today of a sea bird which circled over him—like a good spirit come to keep me company—as this liner disappeared in the distance. "I prayed to God to help me stay afloat," said Thomas Montanez, 32, ship's carpenter, of New York City, in an account radioed to the Associated Press. Montanez, picked up by his ship Friday after it turned back 23 miles to search for him, told of being temporarily blinded by salt water and of lashing out toward the ship when he heard the pro-peller. When rescued, Montanez was able to walk to his shipboard room with slight assistance. The Santa Clara, carrying 30 passengers, was enroute from Barranquilla, Colombia, to New York.

### Murder And Suicide in Winnipeg Hospital

WINNIPEG, Feb. 22 — (CP)—Police said today a young husband stabbed his wife to death Saturday in a Winnipeg hospital where she was a patient and then killed himself by thrusting a hunting knife into his chest. The dead: Pierre Charlier, 32, of Montmartre, Sask., and Mrs. Cecile Charlier, 31, mother of two children. Police said the woman had come to Winnipeg from her South Saskatchewan home Feb. 10 and had entered hospital for treatment of a nervous condition.

### Pugwash Resident Burned To Death

PUGWASH, N. S., Feb. 22 — (CP)—Fire claimed its 13th victim in Nova Scotia this month when Aubrey C. Van Buskirk, 48 who lives near here, died of suffocation last night as his home was damaged by fire. His wife and four children escaped uninjured and the fire was controlled before the home was destroyed. The victim and his family had retired for the night when the fire—of unknown origin—broke out.

### Seven Foot Drifts In Parts Of England

LONDON, Feb. 22—(CP)—Snow-drifts seven feet deep isolated six villages in the Southern England counties of Kent and Sussex today. Fresh falls were general over France which, along with the rest of the continent, had the most severe winter weather since last February.

### Split Develops In Alberta Government

EDMONTON, Feb. 22 — (CP)—Premier Manning's announcement Saturday of the resignations on request by a member of Alberta's Social Credit Government and a Deputy Minister aroused speculation tonight as to whether it was the first open break between "Manningites" and "Douglasites"—followers of the theorist of Major C.H. Douglas, founder of Social Credit. Premier Manning disclosed that Hon. R.E. Ansley, Minister of Education, and L.D. Byrne, Deputy Minister of Economic Development, had resigned. Mr. Manning said it was found that Mr. Byrne advocated policies at "distinct variance with those of the Government and the social credit movement in Alberta" and Mr. Ansley "found himself unable to dissociate himself from the position taken by Mr. Byrne." Divergent views as to what steps should be taken to put Social Credit monetary policies into effect have caused unrest among supporters of the Alberta Government.

In producing this tough guy in a laboratory the scientists were running a race with nature. Nature, too, was turning out a new model fly every year. Each crop was harder to kill with the powerful new poison, DDT.

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### Prepare To Observe Army Anniversary

LONDON, Feb. 22 — (AP)—Marshal Nikolai A. Bulganin, Russia's Minister of Armed Forces, said tonight that the world situation compels the Soviet Union to live "in constant fighting preparedness." Moscow radio reported. Bulganin told the Soviet nation that "so long as imperialism exists, there remains a danger of attack on our country." His message was an order of the day marking tomorrow's 80th anniversary of the Soviet Army and Navy's founding. It was reported by Tass agency and a broadcast of the dispatch was heard here.

### Three Arrested After Wild Chase In Toronto

TORONTO, Feb. 22 — (CP)—A wild chase through West-Toronto streets early today resulted in the arrest of three men—one shot in the stomach—and climaxed an alleged break-in at the Ontario Licence Bureau office, Fort Erie, Ont. The trio are held on charges of shopbreaking while a fourth man is being sought by police.

### Montreal Lawyer In 5 Million Will Case

MONTREAL, Feb. 22 — (CP)—A Montreal lawyer today entered the legal battle over a \$5,000,000 estate contested by the widow of a British tobacco magnate against a former London dancer. Marcel Marcus said he had been retained by Lady Maurelia Martha Cunliffe-Owen to audit the will of Sir Hugo Cunliffe-Owen, president of the British-American Tobacco Company, who died Dec. 14 at the age of 77.

### Reports Mars Is Chilly Planet

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Feb. 22—(AP)—Dr. V. M. Slipher, who calls himself a "long distance Martian weatherman," reported Saturday that a mid-summer day's maximum temperature on Mars is still below freezing. The director of Lowell Observatory said a 20-year temperature test, with an instrument known as the thermocouple, shows that Mars is much too cold for pleasant living. Its 141,000,000 miles distance from the sun, compared with earth's 93,000,000, leave it with temperatures which reach only about 25 degrees Fahrenheit in summer.

### Liberal's Forecast Tax Cut In Budget

OTTAWA, Feb. 22 — (CP)—Liberal members of the Commons have not been given an indication as to when Finance Minister Abbott will bring down his budget for the 1948-49 fiscal year, but many of them are suggesting both publicly and privately fairly heavy tax cuts. Our Liberal member said he was told that Mr. Abbott is so busy handling exchange conservation and other emergency legislation that he has had little time to work on the budget. He guessed that the budget would be brought down before the Easter recess next month, but other members speculated that Mr. Abbott would make his budget speech about the same time as last year, April 29. ### Rent Controls Lifted On Tourist Cabins

OTTAWA, Feb. 22 — (CP)—The Prices Board tonight announced that rent and eviction controls have been lifted from tourist cabins, summer cottages, ski lodges, winter chalets and hunting chalets which now are vacant or may become unoccupied. Current tenants are still protected by rental regulations and cannot be required to vacate so long as they are well behaved. If a tenant vacates then the accommodation will be free of control.

### "Dream Enlarger" For New Camera

FORT MONMOUTH, N.J., Feb. 22 — (AP)—The United States Army, which is developing a "dream camera," announced Saturday a "dream enlarger" to accompany it. The enlarger can be operated in daylight. It determines the exposure for a print automatically. The paper is built in the easel in which it is exposed. The Army announced the "dream camera" last November. It is impervious to bumps, wet and temperature, and takes pictures automatically as fast as the photographer can trip the shutter.

### Youths Charged With Armed Robbery

WOODSTOCK, Ont., Feb. 22 — (CP)—Alec Torak, 20, and Joseph Tanyi, 19, both of Windsor, are in Oxford County Jail today following their arrest by police sergeant Sam Ham, Tillsonburg, in connection with the armed robbery of a Tillsonburg clothing store Saturday night. Tillsonburg police said that two armed men entered the Benny Joseph clothing store in Tillsonburg, ordered the clerk, William Wood, 21, to open the till, scooped the contents, approximately \$97, and made their getaway.

### Prominent Saint John Business Man Dies

SAINT JOHN, N. E., Feb. 22 — (CP)—A prominent Saint John business man, George Lookhart Warwick, manager of Hayward and Warwick Ltd., china and silverware dealers, died today. He was engaged in the business for more than 50 years. He was 70.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 22 — (CP)—Frank Ferraro, 33, of Belleville, Ont., was acquitted Saturday on a charge of murder in the dance hall death Jan. 20 of taxi driver Hugh Schott, 48. The jury deliberated 15 minutes. Schott was killed in a fight at the dance hall.

### Bomb Trucks Were Placed By Arabs

JERUSALEM, Feb. 22 — (AP)—Two truckloads of explosives shattered the heart of the Jewish business district in Jerusalem today and hospital reports put the number at 43. A previous British announcement said 85 persons were killed and at least 88 injured. (Reliable Jewish sources reported 51 persons dead, Reuters News Agency said.) The Arabs said their Syrian-trained commandoes planted the explosives. Reprisal fighting followed however, and by nightfall nine British soldiers had been killed and eight wounded and one

### Nephew Of Halifax Man Among Those Killed

HALIFAX, Feb. 22 — (CP)—Fit. Lt. Douglas Cox, nephew of Col. A. N. Jones of Halifax, was one of more than 40 persons killed when a vast explosion shattered buildings in the Jewish business district of Jerusalem today. News of his death was cabled here by Col. Jones' sister, Mrs. R. D. Cox. Fit. Lt. Cox was a member of an R. A. F. regiment stationed in Jerusalem. He was 28.

### Jew Killed And 12 Others Wounded

It was the worst bombing of the warfare that has grown out of the United Nations decision to partition Palestine. The blast was set off by two trucks of explosives. It levelled buildings along Zion Square, street in Zion Square and broke windows a half mile away. It took place in dawn. Tonight, in the light of great spotlights set up in the ruins, dirt-grimed squads of Jews still dug with picks, shovels and their bare

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### Weather Synopsis Issued by Dominion Public Weather Office tonight

Synopsis: A storm developed suddenly off the southeast coast of the United States Saturday night and moved rapidly north-eastward. By Sunday evening it was causing snow over all of Nova Scotia and most of Prince Edward Island. In New Brunswick the weather was clear and cold with temperatures near zero. The high pressure responsible for this fine weather is not moving very fast and little change is expected there. This cold air will spread over most of the district Monday as the storm moves off to the east and the weather will be generally fine. However some snowflurries can be expected near the coasts where the wind blows off the water. Forecasts, valid until Monday midnight:

### Prince Edward Island: Intermittent snow during the night. More day cloudy with scattered snowflurries. Little change in temperature, northeast winds 20. Low early Monday morning and high in the afternoon at Charlottetown 13 and 20.

High tide this morning at 10:11 and tonight at 9:27. Sun sets this afternoon at 5:30 and rises tomorrow morning at 6:49. Full moon February 24th, 1:11 P. M. Summer tide eighteen minutes later than Charlottetown.
